To Hunt Germs in Water.

Cleveland, O., Nov. 4.—The state board of health will commence a Lake Erie survey at Cleveland, next week, to gather data for a report on the sources of contamination of the water supply of hundreds of cities and villages of Northern Ohio. Samples of water will be taken at various distances from the shore and bacteriological tests will be made in each instance. The results will later be tabulated and comparisons made between water at and near the Cleveland harbor and intake and at other points along the lake.

All of the cities of the great lakes, both in the United States and Canada, will take part in the pure water movement, it is believed. Cleveland has gone a step further than most of the lake cities as it has already engaged an expert.



DEATH OF JAMES LEDGER AT GANANOQUE.

J. R. Dargavel Was Chosen as the Conservative Candidate for Leeds in the Coming Provincial Elections.

Gananoque, Nov. 4.—James Ledger passed away, on Thursday night, at the family residence, Brock street, in the seventy-first year of his age. Deceased suffered a paralytic stroke several weeks ago. He had resided here for many years and was known as a hard working and industrious man. His wife, formerly a Miss Bishop, survives him. Out of a family of eighteen children, only four survive him, three sons, Ozie, of Gananoque; Alcock, of Toronto; George, of Alexandria Bay, and one daughter, Mrs. Henry Brown, of Peterborough. The funeral took place this morning to St. John's church, where requiem mass was sung by Rev. Father J. P. Keehoe, and the remains were interred at the Roman Catholic cemetery.

The funeral of the late Enoch J. Atkinson, took place this afternoon from the home of his uncle, James Atkinson, of Gananoque, cemetery, and was quite largely attended. Deceased was forty years of age, and had been in failing health for several months.
