R.M.C. BEAT VARSITY RUGBY GAME

BY 23 TO 18 IN INTERMEDIATE Varsity's Lead in the Third Quarter Was Overcome.

Toronto, Nov. 4.—The first of the home-and-home games for the intermediate championship of the intercollegiate union was played this morning, between Royal Military College Cadets, of Kingston, and Varsity II, before a fair crowd.

In the first quarter, R.M.C. showed splendid form, and despite the greasy turf, many substantial gains by end runs and plunged plays, they tore up Varsity line easily and did some particularly pretty passing on back division. R.M.C. scored the first point when McLaren was forced to ronge. The Cadets to get the ball a foot outside the line, it proved a boomerang to Varsity, as they lost the ball for interference on the first down, and McAuley bucked over for a touch down, which was not converted. Score, R.M.C., 6; Varsity II, 0.

In the third quarter Varsity forced the play from the kick off and when R.M.C. scrimmaged just outside their line Varsity wings blocked the punt and Nicholson grabbed the loose ball and wiggled over for a touch, which was not converted. Varsity II, 10; R.M.C., 12.

Varsity hammered cadets back to their line, stole the ball right on the line and Gardner, quarter-back, bucked over for another try, which was converted. Varsity 17, R.M.C., 12.

The game ended 23 to 18, in favor of Royal Military College.

Two feet of snow fell Thursday around South Bend, Ind.

General Madero will be inaugurated president of Mexico on November 6th. All cattle coming and going into Connecticut, hereafter must have a certificate of good health.

At Cape Charles, Va., John W. Guy, seventy-nine years old and the father of thirty-two children, is dying.

Toronto ratepayers may be asked to vote an additional million and a half for that city's lighting system.

A female jury at Los Angeles, Cal., acquitted Editor A. A. King of a charge of printing an indecent story.

Members of Andrew's church, Brantford, have settled differences over the pastorate, and Rev. Andrew Allan will stay.

The National Woman's Christian Temperance Union of the United States, has endorsed woman suffrage.

The Ontario Motor League will assist the police in reducing the number of automobile accidents throughout the province.

Governor Foss, Massachusetts, charges Roosevelt and others with soliciting funds for state republicans, and demands an enquiry.

The German press is somewhat agitated over the committal to prison of Lieut. Philip M. Schultz, convicted of spying in England.

Hum Quom, an Ottawa merchant, has been elected as the representative of the Canadian Chinamen in the parliament of China.

The twelve-pounder gun so heroically defended at Lilliefontaine, has been presented to the city of Ottawa and will be placed in the city hall square.

The national assembly has forced on the Chinese the adoption of a limited monarchy and supremacy of parliament.

For the second time within a month the steamer Haywood, was beached near Harbor Beach, Mich., and the crew of ten rescued with difficulty.

Stuyvesant Fish, New York, has been appointed to head a committee to investigate the labor conditions of the plants of the United States Steel Corporation.

At Montreal, on Thursday, \$1,000, 574 in taxes was taken in over the civic counters. Of the 1,000 accounts settled, the C.P.R. paid \$123,000 and the G.T.R., \$82,000.

Simoneau and Dion, contractors, of Quebec, are being sued by one Labrie for \$2,000, for the loss of two senes, (saws) and the result of a fall he sustained while working for them.

A new corporation is about to be formed in New York, merging six hundred five and ten cent store. Knox is included in the deal. Kingston ladies may now look for cheap ostrich plumes.

Julien Grouon, aged ten years, playing tag in a school room in Montreal, jumped from a table to a bench and, incidentally, to his death, as he fell to the floor on his head and died shortly afterwards.

At Chicago, James Carney, who saved ninety-six lives from the wreck of the steamer Lady Elgin, when 297 persons lost their lives on Lake Michigan in 1860, is dead, aged seventy-seven.

The city of Ottawa is to commemorate the memory of the late Controller James Davidson, by a public play-ground on Gladstone avenue. The city council has agreed to maintain the play ground at all times.

Lewis Bryan, a millionaire, of Chicago, aged fifty-two years, has a smart wife, just half his age. He tried to get a divorce, and she succeeded in getting an injunction, shutting off all his income above twelve dollars a week, and removing his six automobiles from his control.

A. Masse, labor candidate in St. Mary's division of Montreal, in the recent election, was expelled, for five years, from trade union circles for running as a candidate without the sanction and against the wishes of the Trade and Labor Council.

Fire losses in Canada during October, as computed by the Monetary Times, totalled \$580,790, which compares with \$1,235,550 in September and \$2,195,728 in October last year. The total for the part of October is the smallest of any month in three years.

DIE IN SUICIDE PACT.

"Death by Strychnine" is Verdict of Coroner.

Wootter, O., Nov. 4.—Death from strychnine poisoning is the verdict of Coroner King in the case of Miss Carmen Humphrey, aged nineteen, and Rufus Billard, a young dancing master, who died within a few hours of each other under circumstances indicating a suicide pact.

Billard and Miss Humphrey were engaged to marry. It was shown by one of the witnesses at the inquest that after a recent quarrel the young man had told the girl that she should marry him or nobody.

Miss Humphrey died in convulsions after coming home from a party, Billard being her escort.

Billard's body was found a few hours afterwards near the burial plot of Miss Humphrey's grandparents in the city cemetery. He had left a note to his mother asking forgiveness and requesting that he and Miss Humphrey be buried together.

NOTED MISSIONARY HERE.

Paid a Visit to Rev. W. F. Fitzgerald on Friday.

A noted missionary, Rev. Montague Beauchamp, of the China Inland Mission, was in Kingston on Friday, as guest of Rev. W. F. Fitzgerald. Mr. Beauchamp is one of the famous "Cambridge Seven," who volunteered for mission work in China over twenty years ago. The "Cambridge Seven" was composed of Cambridge graduates noted athletes, and men of means, who, at a great mission meeting, volunteered to go to China, practically at their own expense, and have been laboring there since. Mr. Stodd, of international racket fame, was of the seven, and all of them were members of the famous Cambridge rowing crew. The China Inland Mission is undenominational. Mr. Beauchamp hopes to return to Kingston shortly to speak and preach with reference to the work. While here, he interviewed Dean Bidwell and others with regard to his return visit.

A BIG POSTAL INCREASE.

Returns of Montreal Post Office Shows Substantial Advance.

Montreal, Nov. 4.—The returns of the Montreal post office for October show an increase in all directions over those of the corresponding period last year.

The revenue last month from all sources amounted to \$102,927.96, an increase of \$11,979.87. This sum was made up as follows: Receipts from vendors, \$89,339.53; from permits, \$3,221.10; newspaper postage, \$5,411.66; box rents, \$51.67. During the month there were received from Great Britain 2,656 sacks of mail matter 1,132 via Canadian lines, and 1,521 via New York, an increase of 234 sacks.

Letters sent to Great Britain weighed 26,227 pounds, and to other countries, 6,826. Printed matter for Great Britain weighed 80,203 pounds, and to other countries, 8,406 pounds. Parcels sent numbered 2,851. These figures prove an increase over October last year of 6,492 pounds of letters, 63,197 pounds of printed matter, and 704 parcels. Registered letters and parcels numbered 153,144, an increase of 14,627 articles registered.
