"GASTRITIS" BLAMED

ARSENIC IN STOMACH OF VERMILYA BOARDER.

Police Have Investigated Nine Deaths of Friends and Relatives of Strange Chicago Woman.

Chicago, Nov. 6.—A resounding of the guards about Mrs. Louis E. Vermyla and admission by the authorities that a partial investigation has been completed of nine deaths of friends and relatives of the woman, made significant the report, today, that a chemical analysis of the viscera of L'Eslemaur Arthur Bissonnet, one of the nine decedents had disclosed the presence of two grains of arsenic.

It was stated that the exact analysis would be made public late, today. Governor Hoffman refused to divulge its contents until he had made further investigation. He admitted that during his absence of the past few days he has been quietly looking into the circumstances of the deaths of several other persons—all associated one time with Mrs. Vermilya—in small towns nearby.

Of the nine persons who had died at Mrs. Vermilya's home, two, and possibly three, were husbands, and three were relatives. The certificates of their deaths, as returned to the county authorities, indicate that "gastritis" was given as the cause in each instance.

MERGER OF CHURCH SOCIETIES.

Chicago, Nov. 6.—A plan to merge all the young people's church societies in Canada and the United States as a force to fight the liquor traffic, the social evil and dishonesty in public life, was effected at a meeting of the organization known as America's Young People. The chief means by which these things are to be attacked is through a campaign to induce young men to enter local politics.

Each church society will retain its separate organization, and merge only for the set purposes. The merger is to be effected by the International Citizenship committee of Young People's Societies, of which Harry S. Warner, of Chicago, was named chairman.

There are 15,000,000 young people enrolled in the various church societies in Canada and in the United States," said Mr. Warner, "constituting a tremendous force, which can be organized and set to work to do much to elevate citizenship and public morals."
