THE TRUE CONDITION

WITH REGARD TO THE SIEGE OF TRIPOLI.

The Italian Army is Demoralized—The Men Disgusted With the War and Long to Return Home.

London, Nov. 6.—"Ananias, in its business days, never wrote half so many falsehoods and misrepresentations as have appeared in the Italian press in the official statements issued by the Italian government," telegraphs the correspondent of Reuters Telegram Co. Ltd., at Tripoli, who arrived at Malta, to-day.

From Malta he was able to send an uncensored message which contains a pessimistic description of the condition of the Italian army around what he terms the besieged city of Tripoli. He says:

"I sum up the result of the campaign. The Italians hold with nearly twice as many men, half the ground that they held three weeks ago. They have lost in killed and wounded, not counting the sick, well over 1,000 men. Many Arabs have been killed and vast numbers were shot in cold blood. Now 25,000 soldiers find themselves with their backs to the sea, cramped and confined, with an active enemy within a few yards of them and with cholera raging among them. Despite official efforts to conceal the truth, there have been many cases among the troops and the civil population suffering so much that whole streets in Tripoli have been closed by armed sentries."

"There has been no disgrace. On the contrary, the Italian troops fought with great courage and their officers set a noble example."

FATHER SECURED CHILDREN.

Case Before Magistrate in Juvenile Court.

Some time was taken up in the juvenile court, on Monday morning. It had to do with the possession of two children, and the case is an extremely sad one. The father has been living in the west, and the mother was recently removed to a hospital. The children were given over into the charge of the mother's parents, and they were content to keep the children, a boy, aged four, and a girl, three years old, both bright children, but the father wished to have control of them, and they were handed over to him.

Solomon White, mayor of Cobalt, formerly of Windsor, is seriously ill.

Rev. Henry Thomas, Methodist minister, died at Colborne, on Sunday.

Three more candidates for the legislature were named by the independent labor party.

The body of Mrs. Christina Hanson, seventy-four years old, was found in Ashbridge's Bay, Toronto.

Mrs. Lottie Ebov, of Galt, took a dose of carbolic acid, on Saturday, and is seriously ill in hospital.

At Chicago, a crusade against objectionable post cards has been started by Postmaster D. A. Campbell.

Sir Hugh Gilzean Reid died, at Rome, on Sunday. He was first president of the world's press parliament.

Five towns in Hamilton county are going to vote on local option in January. The contest is a very bitter one.

The body of B. H. O'Donnell, of Brooklyn, N.Y., who jumped from a train at Belleville, was found in the Moira river.

Canadian Pacific gross for week ending October 31st, ten days, follows: 1911, \$3,075,000; 1910, \$3,271,000; increase, \$206,000.

The flying post special train struck Frederick Bell's wagon at Burlington. Both horses were killed and Mr. Bell's legs broken.

Hon. J. B. Pelletier, the new postmaster-general, will be entertained at a banquet on December 2nd next, by his friends in Quebec.

The French minister of public works will introduce a bill establishing a minimum salary for women workers at home to prevent the sweating system.

A special convocation will be held at McGill University on December 12th, for the purpose of conferring the degree of doctor of laws on the Duke of Connaught.

The traffic earnings of the Grand Trunk railway for the last week of October were \$1,563,496, against \$1,392,943 of the same week last year, an increase of \$170,553.

Four other former governors-general of Canada, the Duke of Argyll, Lord Lansdowne, Lord Aberdeen and Lord Minto, will attend the presentation of the freedom of London to Earl Grey.

An imperial challenge competition open to the services of the whole British empire, will be held on any available range between April 15th and May 24th next year.

A. N. Black, of Durham, Ont., is making money raising foxes and selling their pelts. Last week he cleared \$2,000, and has an offer of \$500 for two exceptionally fine black skins, still in his possession.

Rev. H. Bingham, Baptist minister of London, Ont., has furnished a room in the basement of his church, as a nursery, so that mothers may leave their crying babies there during service. Several young women have volunteered as nurses.

The government has fixed a new standard for maple sugar and syrup. The standard is long and complicated, but dealers among other things that there must not be more than ten per cent. water in sugar or above thirty-five per cent. water in the syrup.

Thomas Cooper was fined \$50 and sent to jail for six months by Judge Bowring, of Chatham, for personation of the dominion election. Charges of perjury in connection with the registration were dismissed, as the judge held that the registration board was not properly constituted.

AT THE POLICE COURT.

Small Docket Before the Magistrate on Monday.

Magistrate Farrell had a rather small docket, on Monday morning.

Some time was taken up in the taking of evidence in the case of A. O. Abrams, accused of cruelty to a horse, by Constable Arnel, the officer for the Humane Society. After evidence had been taken on both sides, the case was adjourned for a week in order to give defence a chance to get additional witnesses.

J. B. Walken appeared for the Humane Society, and T. J. Rigney appeared on behalf of the accused. The witnesses for the prosecution claimed that the horse was not properly cared for, after being placed in pasture, and that this neglect was the direct cause of it having to be shot. On the other hand the accused claimed that the horse was properly looked after.

A woman, who told the magistrate that it was the first time she had ever been before the court, was on the charge for being drunk, and was given a chance to go to Deseronto, where she said she had employment. One male was fined \$5 and costs, and the other was given a chance, on a charge of drunkenness.

HE BLEED TO DEATH

FOUND IN BUSHES AFTER FOUR DAYS SEARCH.

Was Thrown From Rig—Prominent Resident of Simcoe County Meets Sad End.

Barris, Ont., Nov. 6.—The dead body of David Barclay, an unmarried man, seventy years of age, who has been missing from his home at Stroud since Thursday, was found behind some low bushes near the roadside just east of LeRoy, on Saturday. He is said to have fallen from his rig while intoxicated, death ensuing from a cut on the wrist made by some broken glass. It is supposed that Barclay had been behind a dump of bushes, where he died from bleeding to death. A diligent search had been kept up for him since Tuesday night, but no one suspected that he had been in the neighborhood where the body was found, which is some seven miles from his home. John and George Barclay are brothers of the deceased, who was widely known in the district. Barclay post office, just a few miles south of Stroud, was named after this family.

PERISH IN FIRE.

Leaky Gas Jet Cause of Triple Tragedy.

Elmira, N.Y., Nov. 6.—Walter Tompkins, prominent fruit grower, his wife and fourteen-year-old son, all perished in the flames which descended on his home at Addison, N.Y., last evening.

The fire was discovered by Engineer Timothy Train, of the Buffalo & Susquehanna railroad, who, while his train was passing the spot saw the flames and shrieked a warning with the locomotive whistle. The fire was quickly responded, but the fire was beyond control.

The charred bodies of the three victims were found in the debris. The fire is thought to have started from a leaky gas jet. Tompkins and his family were probably overcome by the fumes while asleep and thus could not escape.

Auto Ran Into Ditch.

Workmen belonging to the city gang were engaged in digging a drain between Centre and Clergy streets, on Tuesday morning. At noon they left their work to go home to dinner. Shortly after twelve o'clock an automobile, driven by a local enthusiast came along at a lively slip. Evidently, the driver did not notice the drain, for he never swerved from his course. The result was that the front wheels dropped into the excavation. The force at which the car was travelling propelled the front wheels out of the ditch, but the fast diminishing speed was insufficient to lift the car wheels out and the machine was stalled there. The men had not left their work yet and assisted the hapless driver to get his machine started. It was not damaged in any way for as soon as the engine was cranked the auto went off all right.

Will Seek Damages.

It is understood that A. D. Abrams will seek damages to the extent of \$50, as the result of the shooting of his horse by the Humane Society. Abrams is charged with cruelty to a horse, but the case has not yet been disposed of, it being adjourned in the police court, to-day, for a week. The accused claims that the horse was well cared for, while the prosecution claims that the animal was neglected and in such a condition as to have to be shot.

Clergyman Invited.

The manager of the Russian classic dancer, Countess de Swirsky, claims that the rumor to the effect that the performance is risqué, is untrue, and intimates that the performance is thoroughly high class. He has issued complimentary tickets to all the clergymen of the city to prove that his contention is correct. The countess appears at the Grand this evening.

A Princess Street Runaway.

Earl Sunday morning a horse attached to a rig dashed down Princess street, the driver unable to control it. Near King street the driver was thrown out and was picked up by Robert Cousins, pretty well shaken up. The horse stopped when it reached the water's edge, evidently not ready for a cold plunge.

Potatoes Not Delivered.

A lady writes the Whig to say that on Saturday she bought two bags of potatoes from a farmer on the market, and paid for them, but the potatoes were not delivered. She says she can identify the farmer, and when she sees him she will report him to the police.

Saturday midnight a man slipped on the walk on Princess street, in front of Corbett's hardware store. In falling he came in contact with the edge of the curb, and received a cut across his forehead, just above the eyes.

The remains of Theodore Martin, who died in St. John, N.B., on Saturday, are expected to arrive in the city at four o'clock Sunday afternoon.
