THE WOMEN WANT VOTES.

The president of the Toronto Suffrage Association, Dr. Margaret Gordon, is giving some attention to the political leaders in Ontario. Sir James Whitney is reminded of the fact that twice during the present parliamentary term he was called upon by deputations who requested that the women be given an extension of the franchise, and petitions, numerously signed, were presented to him. He makes no reference to the subject in his election manifesto, and he is asked to include it.

Mr. Rowell is reminded that at a recent meeting of the Ontario Liberal Association some one remarked: "It was time enough to discuss woman's suffrage when the women solicited it." Dr. Gordon says that in the development of national life no class of men have been forced to petition for the franchise. It has been granted to them unsought, and extended from time to time. It should not be necessary for the women to plead for justice, but they have done so through

petitions and deputations and have not been answered.

The women are generally credited with a desire to advance all women of moral reforms and believe they could do better if they possessed the franchise. They have this franchise to a limited extent now. How have they used it? Once they were not at all anxious on the liquor license question, and once they are said to have given themselves up to doubtful proceedings in connection with a bonus by-law. Of course, these were the few, the very few, and it is regrettable that some women voters need watching as much as the men.

On the whole, however, it is probable that they would make a better use of their votes than a similar number of men, and it is inconceivable that they would be as corrupt. Would they support the party which promises them the franchise. If there were any assurance of this there would be something heard in their behalf without delay.

LABOUR MEMBER EXPELLED.

The Trades and Labour Council of Montreal has come into notice by its expulsion of a member, J. A. Masse, and because he defiantly violated one of its rules. He became a candidate in the recent federal election, as an independent, of course, (and a conservative), and he did this knowing that he could, and no doubt would, be called to account. He is an ex-president of the council, and admits that while in office he did what he could to have the rules amended to suit him, and without result.

One clause of the constitution forbids a member of the Labour Congress taking the public platform in advocacy of a candidate that has not been endorsed by the labour party. The obligation of the member binds him to a strict observance of the rules of the council, and this obligation Mr. Masse took. He ignored the rules, and he antagonized the council, by accepting a political nomination without the endorsement of the labour party. For this he was duly tried and deprived of his standing in the council for five years.

He cries "Politics, politics," and the Montreal Gazette describes his case as a persecution of the party machine. Masse says he would have escaped condemnation had he been a liberal, which he is not, but that is only the talk of a disappointed man. Masse knows the object of the rules to which the Labour Council closely adheres. It does not prevent any man from exercising his franchise, freely, as an elector. He can vote for and support whom he likes.

But when he becomes a candidate in the interest of the labour party, as Masse did, without the labour party's assent, he invited attack, and his expulsion from the council is meant as an object lesson, and to the effect that the council will not stand for the defiance and misrepresentation of any member. If Masse did not like the rules of the council he should have resigned from it. He was under no compulsion to remain a member of the labour party. While he did what was expected of him that he would live up to his privileges and obligations.

BREAKING INTO THE PARTY.

Hon. Mr. White has returned from Leeds to Ottawa, a member of the government with a seat, and he may be happy. Yet it is doubtful. No man could have a more uncomfortable time than he since he received the invitation of Hon. Mr. Borden to join him in the government. The city that knew him best, the city in which he lived, the people among whom he labored, and the men with whom he fought, politically, refused to accept him as a representative. The city to which he was called, and in which he declared he had found a "home among friends," made no sign of its pleasure. There certainly was no offer of an asylum there. Hence his appeal to Leeds.

And the deal for a refuge here appears to have been humiliating enough. Mr. Taylor had to be provided for. He was appointed a master of a little country post office, which disqualified him as a member and placed his seat at Mr. White's disposal. Mr. Taylor's majority in the last election was so large that it was felt some chances could be run of offending the electors. And a lot of them were offended, and because there was too much of a bargain about the case, and they were not consulted. Many conservatives talked of opposing the minister. His meeting with some of them has been described as embarrassing.

ing in the extreme. Nor is there an end of the unpleasantness, though the liberals, at the last moment, decided to let him have the seat without a contest. Mr. Taylor, at a Gananoque meeting, intimated that he would be still on the job, as director of political events in the county, that he would some of these days become a senator, and as Mr. White would be a busy man, he, the old war horse, would attend to all the chores. He would dispense the patronage! Mr. White, however, gave assurance of his undying devotion to the people by saying that he would regard them as his own, and he would show his appreciation of the fact by living among them, in Gananoque. That was the climax!

Mr. White says he entered the conservative party by the open door. Did he? One would interpret the circumstances as indicating that he was breaking into it, and under conditions that must be trying to any sensitive man. When he accepted the invitation to join Mr. Borden in a government he had no expectation that the way to glory and to service would be paved with so many difficulties. If he had to do it over again he would hesitate about seeking an office which was so clearly begrudged him by the party and in the possession of which he has been shown so much hostility.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

The education department is very much in the limelight in this local election. It is the weak and defective department of the government and can never be anything else under Dr. Pyne.

REFORM IN METHOD

WILL LIVE WITH POOR IN SLUMS.

Committee in Charge of Forward Movement Declares Professional Charity Experts Are Not to be Used.

Chicago, Nov. 7.—Twelve well-known business and professional men of Chicago will forsake their usual pursuits and make their homes a time and live in the slums of Chicago, if plans under consideration by the social service committee of the Men and Religion Forward Movement are adopted.

The need of first-hand information as to conditions in the poorer districts of the city is the cause for this contemplated radical move.

Reform in the manner of life and work of the immigrant classes is one of the things which is being emphasized the most in the men's movement, and such information is considered essential to the work.

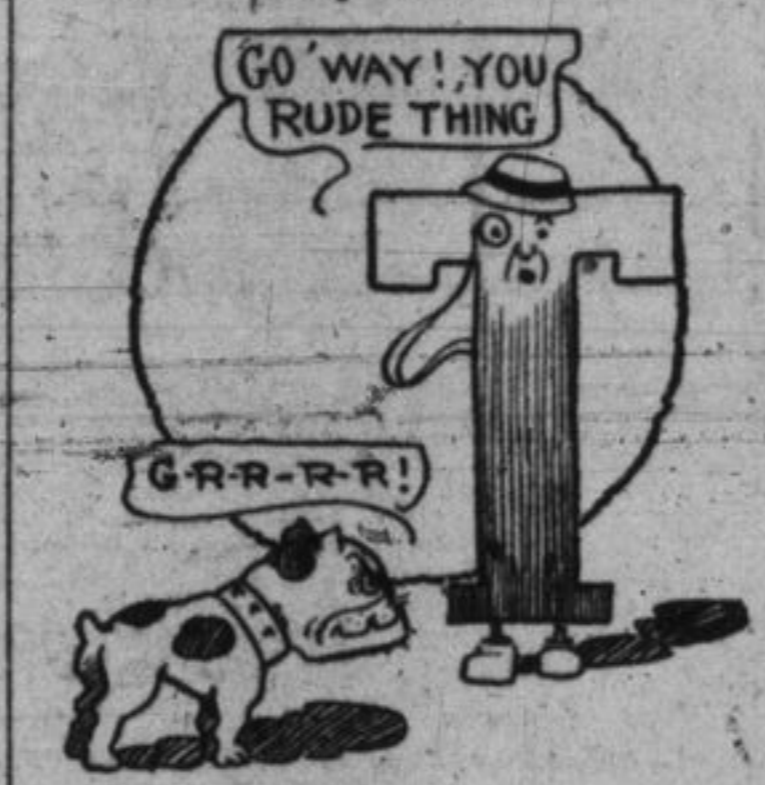
"This is the most radical move ever contemplated by any religious movement," I believe," said H. T. Williams, local secretary of the men's movement. "We have had the matter under consideration for a long time, and I believe that it will be adopted."

"The plan is to have the men go in pairs, live in the tenements and work with the men there. In fact, we want them to live exactly as the tenement dwellers do. This will remove the reproach, from us, at least, that one-half the world does not know how the other half lives."

Only men who can afford to leave their work for a month or two will be asked to take up this work, according to Mr. Williams. Professional charity workers are not desired, as they might have preconceived ideas which would not leave their minds open to the impressions received.
