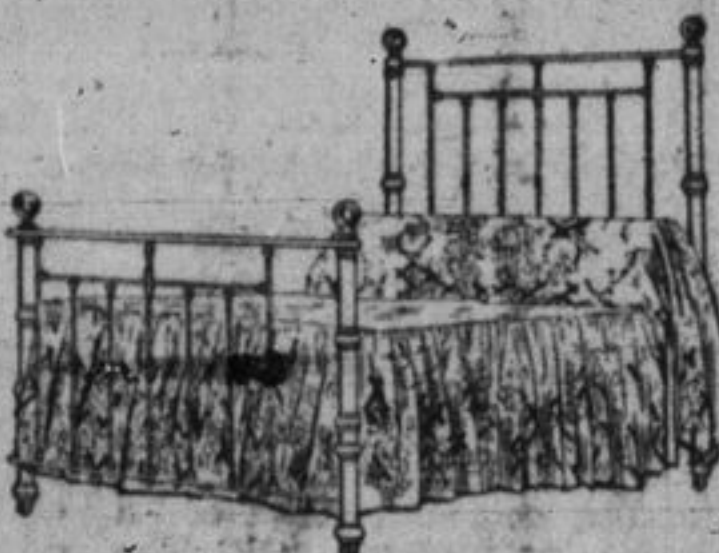

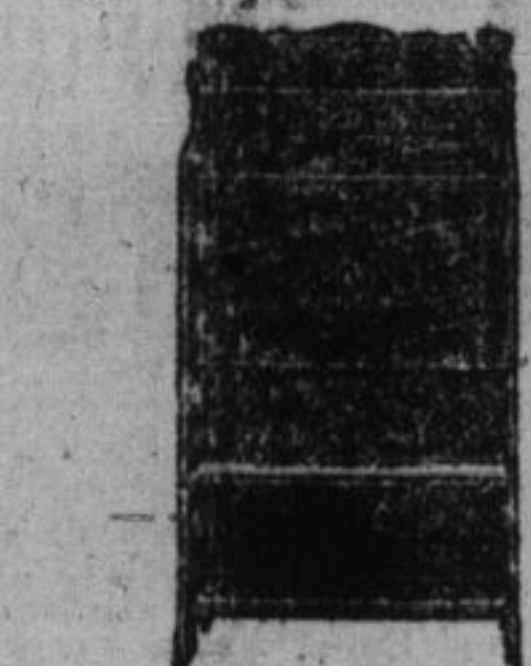

Inspiring addresses were delivered by several in the clergy.
