ACACIA IN TROUBLE

SHE WAS BATTERED ABOUT DURING THE STORM.

Dragged Her Anchor—and Drifted Down the River—She Was Leaking Badly—Abandonment of the Storm Saved Her.

The schooner Acacia had quite a time during the storm in the harbor on Tuesday. She arrived on Monday from Oswego, with coal for Woodman & Cramer, of Wolfe Island. On Tuesday the storm was so great that she took shelter at the foot of Garden Island. During the afternoon she started to drift. She dragged along her anchor for nearly two miles down along the main shore of Wolfe Island. At about three o'clock, when the steamer Wolfe Islander was going over to the island, on her usual trip, she noticed that the Acacia was in trouble, as the captain had hoisted a white flag of distress. The Wolfe Islander went as near as possible to her and found that she was leaking, but she could do nothing. People watched the Acacia being tossed around by the huge waves. Capt. Taylor was the only person on board.

The Acacia drifted two miles down the river, and it was feared she would go ashore or sink. However, the storm abated and the Acacia was able to make port on Wednesday. She had been pumped out.

AT RECEPTION TO THE ARCH-BISHOP-ELECT.

One Will be Tendered by Clergy and Other From Congregation of St. Mary's—Committees at Work Preparing For Reception—Big Demonstration Looked For.

On Tuesday evening, a meeting of the general committee appointed to look after the arrangements for the reception to the archbishop-elect, Rev. Father Spratt, on the occasion of his consecration at St. Mary's cathedral, on November 30th, was held.

J. J. Behan, was appointed secretary and E. T. Stacey treasurer. Sub-committees were appointed to look after the details of the reception, which will be tendered the archbishop-elect and the delegates. They will arrive in Kingston on the evening of November 29th, the night before the consecration.

An address will be presented to the archbishop-elect, by the clergy of the diocese, and also by the members of St. Mary's congregation, upon his arrival at the cathedral. Arrangements are also to be made for a reception to be given the apostolic delegate. The presidents of the different Catholic societies of the city will be urged to have as large attendance as possible, for the reception, so as to make the demonstration a most imposing one.

An appeal will be made Sunday next for funds to defray all the necessary expenditure for the demonstration.
