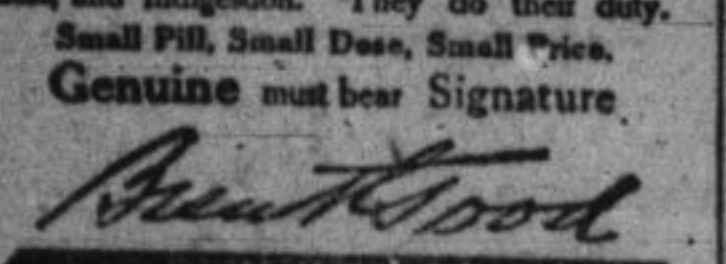

SCALES OF THE EEL

VERY MINUTE AND RESEMBLE HERRING BONE BRICKWORK. The Scales Tell the Age of the Eel—How the Scales Are Formed.

In the ordinary conception of the term the eel is a scaleless fish. But it is due to the fact that its scales are very minute and imbedded in the skin. They form, as pointed out by a correspondent, very interesting and beautiful objects for the microscope. In size the scales of the eel vary from one-twentieth of an inch upward, according to the age of the fish. They are formed of two layers of a clear, horny substance, the upper of which is studded with crystals of calcium carbonate. These are so transparent as to look like empty cells. The scales vary in shape from a blunt to an elongated oval and are sometimes almost kidney shaped.

This is how the scales of the eel tell its age. On each may be observed at intervals several more or less clearly marked lines parallel to the margin. These mark lines of growth, one for each year of the life of the fish. Three years—however, must be allowed for the innermost ring, as the eel has no scales until the third year. The scales do not overlap to any extent and are arranged in series of small groups at right angles to each other, so as to resemble what is known as herring bone brickwork. Conger eels, however, are said to have no scales—London Field.

Ancient Inkstands. An inkstand that was probably in use 3,400 years ago is exhibited in a Berlin museum. It is of Egyptian make and is supposed to belong to the eighteenth or nineteenth dynasty, or somewhere about 1800 B. C., although its real age can be judged only approximately. It is made of wood and has two compartments, an upper one provided with two holes, one for black and one for red ink, and a lower one for holding reed pens. The black and red ink are certain, for some still remains, in a dry condition, within the receptacles. Another ancient inkstand is supposed to have been intended for the use of a schoolboy. It was certainly hold ink enough for a schoolboy's needs, for it has no fewer than four ink holes. Both inkstands were found at Thebes—London Globe.

PITH OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest Culled From All Over the World.

The Ontario government's delay in appointing a board of examiners may interrupt embalmers' business.

It is charged that the White Pass and Yukon railroad has been maintaining a secret rebate list.

Legislation will be passed incorporating the country known as Temiskaming into a new judicial district.

The National Labor Union of Canada, affiliated to the Canadian Federation of Labor, are in session in Quebec.

On Monday President liberals nominated Gustav Ewart for the legislative Conservative nominations were: J. W. Johnson, M.P.E., for West Hastings, and Duncan McArthur, V.S., for North Middlesex.

Attended by many Protestant clergy, the remains of the late Madame Chiquy, widow of the late Father Chiquy, were interred in Mount Royal cemetery, Montreal, on Saturday afternoon.

At Salt Lake City, John Smith, for thirty years presiding patriarch of the Mormon church, and nephew of the founder, died of pneumonia on Tuesday morning in his eightieth year. He leaves seven widows.

Charles Shultz, of Chicago, on Sunday night made a boast that he would not be afraid to "tackle an armed robber." He had barely spoken the words when two armed thugs entered the saloon where Shultz was, he sprang upon one of them and was shot twice.

LEAVE SCHOOL TOO SOON.

Half of Juveniles Do Not Get Enough Education.

Washington, Nov. 7.—"One-half of the children of the nation are out of school," said B. P. Claxton, United States commissioner of education, today. "One of the great problems of the age is to get the boys and girls in the schools and keep them there until they secure a fair education."

More than four millions and a quarter children have quit school after finishing their elementary education who ought to be in the high school. The pupils in high schools represent less than a fourth of the children who ought to be in school.

"Another problem we face is the better training of teachers for their work. Our high school courses, most of all, need revolutionizing."

Produce Growers Combine.

Bloomfield, Nov. 7.—Miss Mary Hubbs, of Queen's university, Kingston, spent Thanksgiving at home. John Randle, of Toronto, spent a few days here. B. C. Gorsline will move into Dr. Cahoon's residence. H. S. Miller shipped a carload of mauling barley last week, price 85 cents per bushel. A great deal of freight is being moved from here.

A widely circulated petition among growers of factory produce, binding them not to contract for the season of 1912, under 35 cents for tomatoes, a bushel, \$10 for sweet corn a ton, and \$20 for shelled green peas a ton, has met with splendid success. A penalty of \$100 imposed for a violation. The ladies aid held a social in the Methodist church on Thanksgiving evening. Walter Young, Angus Lake, Allan McDonald and others, left for Maynooth to hunt deer.

We Shot Two.

Evansville, Ind., Nov. 7.—William J. Walters, aged forty, of Paducah, Ky., was shot and killed, and Robert Finley, aged forty-one, his companion, was shot three times and probably fatally wounded, on Saturday evening, by William Wilson, a detective on the Evansville police force. Wilson is held in jail without bail.

The detective was standing near a street corner when Walters and Finley came up. A quarrel followed, and, according to Finley, Wilson pulled his revolver and began shooting. Finley says neither he nor Walters were armed. Walters is survived by a widow and two children, and Finley a wife and five children.
