WOULD RATHER HANG

THAN SERVE TEN-YEAR TERM IN PENITENTIARY.

Police Kept Close Tab on Frederick Graham, Given Ten Years at St. Thomas for Picking Pockets—He Has a Long Prison Record—Noted Ball Jumper.

Sheriff McCall, of St. Thomas, arrived in the city, on the night train from the west, with a prisoner for the penitentiary, who has a long prison record—He is Frederick Graham, and he was sentenced at St. Thomas, by Justice Teetzel, to ten years for picking pockets.

Declaring that he would rather hang than go to penitentiary for such a long term, Graham has been closely watched, ever since he was sentenced. Sentence was passed upon him on Tuesday, and he was removed to Kingston just as soon as possible.

The sheriff had a constable with him, to help him keep tab on his man. They arrived on the early morning train, and the prisoner was then placed in a cell, at the police station, and left there until nine o'clock in the morning, when he was removed to the big prison at Portsmouth.

Graham was caught red-handed, picking the pockets of people who were at a big Irish picnic at Port Stanley, near St. Thomas, in August last, and he was given a long term on account of his bad record.

The records show that the prisoner has served five years in the state prison, at Elmira, N.Y., three years in Montreal, and it was also shown that he had jumped his bail in Toronto no less than three times.

A very close watch was kept on the prisoner, to see that he did not escape, or even attempt to do away with himself, owing to the threat he had made. He was regarded as a dangerous man, and even while in his cell, at the police station, one of the men was close by all the time, watching him.

Although found guilty by the court on all the charges against him, Graham still protests his innocence. He is a comparatively young man.

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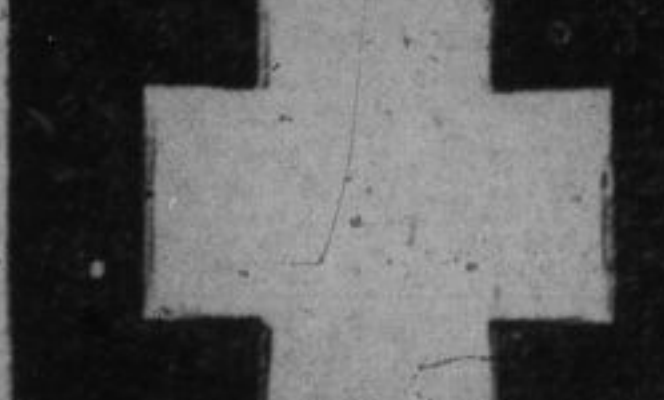
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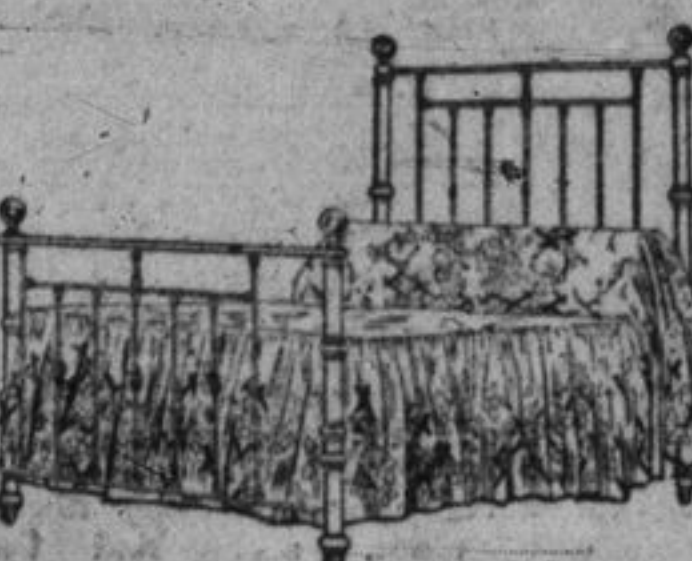
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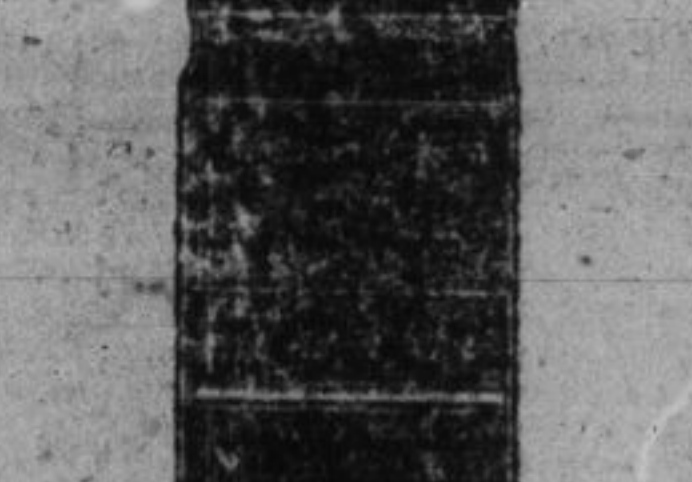
