

### RUGBY ON SATURDAY

THREE GAMES WILL BE PLAYED IN KINGSTON.

Gwynne, Captain of R.M.C. I. Out of the Game Through Injuries—It Will be a Great Day on the Gridiron.

Cadets will await with expectancy the result of to-morrow's contests in which the two rugby teams which represent the best material and skill at the college will battle with Varsity's representatives for two championships. Cadets do not fear for the contest, for if they lose it will be with the satisfaction of knowing that they have done their best to bring honor to their college. The intermediate team, with a lead of five points over Varsity II, will make an interesting time for the boys on the 'Rah, 'Rah college, and it will need all the Toronto trick plays and skill to overcome that lead. It was hoped that Capt. Gwynne would be so far recovered as to be able to play, but the team will have to enter the conflict without him. Fry will take his place on the wing. The lineup of the intermediate team will be: Full back, Galt, halves, McAuley, Carruthers and Lawson; quarter, Blackstock; scrum-half, Greene, Mallory and Greenwood; outside wings, Shoemaker and Fry; middle wings, Roberts and Pearce; inside wings, Sweeney and Storms.

The lineup will be unchanged, and as follows: Full back, Barrow; halves, Hutchison, Murphy and Sutherland; quarter, Rose; scrum-half, Matthews, Whitehead and Denniston; wings, Fisher, Patterson, Latimer, Bishop, Hay and Gendron.

**Queen's vs. McGill.** Queen's has the last chance of the season to win at least one rugby game by defeating McGill here on Saturday. In the finishing game of the Intercollegiate Rugby Union, McGill had no trouble in overcoming the Presbyterians in Montreal by a huge score, and no one is looking for them to do anything different here on Saturday. Queen's had the final practice Thursday afternoon.

**Soccer Team Has Gone.** Queen's soccer team left for Montreal to play the return game with McGill in the Intercollegiate soccer schedule. The win of last Saturday over Varsity has given "Pete" Pilkey a great deal of confidence in his team, and he thinks the team can score a win from the Montrealers.

**Inter-provincial Games.** In the Interprovincial Rugby Union Argonauts play in Ottawa, Saturday, and Hamilton in Montreal, Sunday. In this game it will give them the championship, and if they lose they will be tied with Ottawa Rough Riders. If the Tigers win in Montreal it will make a three-cornered tie.

**Kingston Has Six Teams.** The old Limestone city will be represented by six teams in different lines of sport Saturday. Queen's furnishes one rugby team for a game here, a soccer team for Montreal and a harrier team and a rifle team for Toronto, while Royal Military College has two rugby teams in contests.

**Didn't Do Much Against Queen's.** Although Queen's rugby team is at the top of the list, it nearly took both its games with Ottawa College. In the first, the Ottawas won in the last few minutes by Queen's fumbling, and in the game here two weeks ago, the Ottawas won again on a few fumbles by the Presbyterians. Cornellier, the much-talked-of kicker of the Ottawa team, did not do much against Queen's slow back division, even with a strong wind in his favor in two quarters. If Varsity's halves are alert, the youthful kicker should not do much damage. It was lack of speed and poor catching that beat Queen's. If Varsity has both of these gridiron requirements, it should win to-morrow.

**Kingston Players With Ottawa.** There will be four former Kingston rugby players on the Ottawa team to meet the Toronto Argonauts at the capital on Saturday. "Jack" Williams will play full-back; Stuart Robertson will be on the half-back line; "Ed" Elliott will play outside wing, and J. C. Stewart, now of Postmaster Stewart, and who played with the R.M.C. the past three years, will be in the scrum-half. The latter is 187 pounds, and is a husky player. The Ottawas got him out this week. With these four Kingston men and "Harry" Walsh, the Kingston coach, Ottawas will surely win.

**Basketball Club Meets.** The first meeting of Queen's Basketball Club will be held Friday afternoon, for the purpose of organizing for the season and electing officers. The students will turn their attention to indoor sports.

**Arts '14 Rugby Team.** If the rain ceases Friday afternoon, an '14 rugby team will hold its first practice for the series of inter-year games, which will be pulled off shortly, if the weather will permit.

**Teams Went to Toronto.** The barrier and rifle teams from Queen's University went to Toronto at noon, to-day, to compete in the intercollegiate events, which are to be pulled off. Four men composed the barrier team, while about thirty men were entered for the rifle match.

**Varsity Coming To-night.** Varsity II and III rugby teams will arrive in the city Friday evening, on the local train. The Torontonians are in fine shape and will give the cadets the time of their lives in the two games for the intermediate and junior championships.

**Catarag Hockey Club Meets.** The postponed meeting of the Catarag Hockey Club will be held in the village Friday evening, when plans for the welfare of the team will be discussed, beside electing officers for the year.

DEATH OF MRS. ELIZA CHARLTON, AGED EIGHTY-SIX.

Death in Michigan of William Henderson, Formerly of Gananoque—A Benefit Comedy Produced.

Gananoque, Nov. 10.—Another of Gananoque's well known and highly respected octogenarian residents passed to rest at her home on Victoria avenue, on Wednesday evening, in the person of Eliza Charlton, relict of the late John Charlton, in the eighty-sixth year of her age. Deceased, with her family, came here from Kingston some forty years ago, and had resided here continuously. She enjoyed good health up to a recent date. Out of a large family, one son, Ralph, who resided with her, and one daughter, Mrs. John Moore, First street, alone survive her. Mr. Charlton having predeceased her many years ago. The funeral was private and took place this afternoon, to Willow Bank cemetery.

**IS ENGLISH TO BE USED?** (Continued from Page 1.)

Sub-sec. B of section eighty-two of the public schools' act of the province of Ontario, says: "It shall be the duty of every teacher to... use the English language in instruction and in all communications with the pupils in regard to discipline and the management of the school, except where it is impracticable to do so by reason of the pupil not understanding English, but recitations requiring the use of a text book may be conducted in the language of the text book."

Further, section fifteen of the public school regulations of Ontario for 1911, says: "In school sections where the French or German language prevails, the trustees may, in addition to the course of study prescribed for public schools, require instruction to be given in reading, grammar and composition to such pupils as are directed by their parents or guardians, to study either of these languages, and in such cases the authorized text books in French or German shall be used."

The teaching of French then, is today recognized by the laws of Ontario now, supposing it was proposed to make a change. In that event the British North America Act might be appealed to. Sub-sec. three of section ninety-three of that act provides as follows: "Where in any province a system of separate or dissentient schools existing by law at the union or thereafter established by the legislature of the province, an appeal shall lie to the governor-general-in-council from any act or decision of any provincial authority affecting any right or privilege of the Protestant or Roman Catholic minority of the queen's subjects in relation to education."

Sub-sec. four of the same section, still more clearly defines the ultimate authority of the federal house over education in the provinces in unusual circumstances. Under this section the Dominion government acted in 1896 in Manitoba. The section reads as follows: "In case any such provincial law as now in force in Ontario... require for the due execution of the provisions of this section, and of any decision of the governor-general-in-council under this section."
