THE COLLEGE STUDENTS PLAY CLEANER RUGBY

Than the Teams in the Inter-Provincial and the O.R.F.U.—Standing of the Three Senior Rugby League.

The Toronto Star says: For years the college authorities have been working toward clean football. They have been working from the ground up, and this year have brought the sporting spirit of the game to what approaches perfection.

In the first McGill game here not a man was penalized. In the game at McGill not a man was ruled off, either, and McGill tacklers were especially careful of Jack Maynard, because he had a bad ankle.

In Saturday's game here between Queen's and Varsity, Cruickshanks and his opponent were famous for doing a little wrestling and Captain Maynard was heard to remark to Cruickshanks:

"You've got to square that before you come back."

"There is as much difference as between daylight and darkness in the two games," remarked an official who has handled games in both unions.

"In one game the players try to beat the rules and hand it to their opponents at almost every chance, while in the other the players try to obey the rules and are as considerate of their opponents as is consistent with good hard football.

In the inter-collegiate there is no piling on top of a player already downed, and no one tries to twist a back's leg or to put the knees into a man's stomach as is often done in the Big Four. College players never question a close decision, and there is no talking. It is positively a pleasure to officiate in a college game.

Rugby Club Meets. A meeting of the officers and players of Queen's rugby team will be held in the athletic rooms, Wednesday afternoon, to wind up business for the year. There is important business to transact.

Exhibition Soccer Game. An exhibition soccer game will be played Wednesday afternoon between Queen's and R.C.H.A. at the lower campus. Manager "Pete" Pilkey, Queen's team, is resolved to keep his players in fine trim for the championship match, next Saturday, with Varsity.

Will Go After Hamilton. Should Queen's win the inter-collegiate soccer championship, Saturday, in Toronto, from Varsity, in all probability the team will go after the Hamilton championship, at present held by the Westinghouse team of Hamilton.

Depends on Grounds. Queen's is having its chances for the inter-collegiate soccer championship on the condition of the grounds in Toronto on Saturday. If the ground is wet and soggy, Torontonians will have a much better chance to win than if it is dry. If Queen's has a dry field to play on the team will in all probability, defeat Varsity. Queen's combination is better, but Toronto can kick some.

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INMATES AT THE PEN

Were Addressed by W. F. Nickle, M.P.

W. F. Nickle, M.P., addressed the inmates of the penitentiary on Sunday afternoon, and in an eloquent manner pointed out the many opportunities that awaited them when they were given another chance.

He gave a sketch of Canada, and he also gave an account of the doings of the legislatures and parliaments. He told of the work of the Hydro-Electric Commission, and the great possibilities of electrical energies developed at Niagara Falls, and distributed to the people within reach at cost.

He touched on the efforts being put forth by the state to reduce infantile mortality. Rev. Mr. Conroy, chaplain of the penitentiary, had had charge of the service, and four hundred male voices assisted in the singing.

UNCOVERED OLD JAIL WALL.

While Excavating for the Post Office Extension.

A portion of the foundation wall of the old Kingston jail was unearthed by men at work excavating for the extension to the post office on Wellington street. The old jail and court house were erected between the custom house and the post office about eighty years ago.

It was here that the rebel general Von Shulte was tried in the box of the cornerstone of the building, although his execution took place at Fort Henry. There were several hangings in this old down-town prison. At the post office, it is stated that the caretaker found the hangman's rope, and that it is to be placed in the box of the cornerstone of the post office addition.

SAD PLIGHT OF SOLDIER

WHO ARRIVED IN KINGSTON ON MONDAY FROM QUEBEC.

All His Possessions Were Stolen, Including \$700 and Pension Papers.—He is a First-class Bandsman.

A man—by the name of Tomkins, formerly of the old country, arrived in the city on Monday, and reports that he had been relieved of some \$700 that he had in his possession.

He was formerly in one of the regimental bands in the old country and came to this country and joined the band at Halifax. He and two other members of the Halifax band left there to go to Quebec and join the garrison artillery band there.

When they arrived at Quebec two of them remained but Tomkins thought he would come to this city and join the R.C.H.A. band. While he was in Quebec, he says, he thought his work, to go to what he was told was the Salvation Army quarters for the night. He had all his belongings with him at the time and went to bed, and when he got up in the morning everything was gone.

His belongings consisted of the money mentioned, a coronation medal and his pension papers.

When he arrived in Kingston he immediately tried to enlist in the R.C.H.A. band here but did not succeed. It is a very sad case as he told some people that he did not have a cent in his possession to get a room for the night. Everything that he is a first-class musician. He wrote to Ottawa to see if anything could be done with regard to his pension money. It is likely that work will be secured for him and that he will join the 14th band.
