DELAYED BY STORM

GRAIN VESSELS ON THE WAY TO KINGSTON.

Steamer Navajo—Arrived From Quebec With Cargo of Potatoes. Marine Notes Gathered Around the Harbor.

Five grain carriers are on their way from Fort William, the elevator of the Montreal Transportation Company, but are tied up as a result of the heavy gales. Some of the vessels should have arrived last Sunday, but no word has been received from them. The weather of the past week has been too rough for canal work. The steamers on the way are, the McKinstrey, Gordon, Neppal, Jacques and Saskatoon.

The steamer Windsor arrived light from Montreal, and cleared with the barge Muskoka, for Oswego, to load coal for Montreal.

The steamship Navajo, arrived at Richardson's wharf, Tuesday morning, from Quebec, with a cargo of 1,300 bags of potatoes.

The barge Lackawanna, used in traffic on the Rideau canal, is around a short distance from the city, but it is reported that she is not a very dangerous condition, although not released as yet.

The schooner Ford River, the steamer Sowards, with the schooner Maple, cleared across the lake Tuesday morning.

The government steamer Scout was in port yesterday.

The steamer Strathcona passed up on Monday.

At Swift's wharf—Steamer City of Hamilton—stopped on her way down this morning, heavily laden with freight, and left of considerable steamer Dundurn went west Monday afternoon; steamer Brockville was in port this morning and went east with a cargo of apples; steamer Belleville is expected up today on her last trip of the season.

The barge Norseman, which was sunk of the Grove Inn, has been stripped of her rigging, which is being sold to pay expenses.

A number of vessels which have been lying around Garden Island since Saturday on account of the storm, have all cleared for their respective ports.

All vessels are on the move once more. The tug Frontenac, of the Calvin company, left on Tuesday morning for Melville's Howe Island, where a couple of the barges of the Montreal Transportation company broke away from the tug Bronson and ran aground.

The Worst in Years. "The weather on the lakes this fall has been the worst that I have experienced in years."

Thus spoke an old mariner, the Whig, to-day, who has sailed on the lakes a great many years. He said that the wind storm of the past few days had been terrible. He said that some of the small craft would not have been able to have stood the storm at all, and that it was indeed a lucky thing that the vessels were able to keep in port, and were not caught out on the lake.
