**BI-LINGUALISM NOT WANTED.**

The French papers, liberal and conservative, have taken up the bi-lingual question and protest against the idea that these mixed schools—and mixed as to teaching—shall go. It has been pointed out that the growth of bi-lingualism has been abnormal. Originally provision was made for an exceptional order of things, for the education of French and English children by one teacher when two were not possible. Originally, too, the idea was to care for the French scholars who found themselves in English districts, and handicapped because they could not speak English and make progress with the English scholars. But it was never surmised that the field would grow until the situation became as intense and grave as it is to-day. Let it be understood that no one wants to put the French under disabilities in education as in other matters, but it is too much to look for a continuation of conditions that should pass away in Ontario. This is an English province, an English country, and the people should speak English in commercial, industrial and professional life.

What a time the government of any western province would have that undertook to teach the language of all its foreigners to their children! And yet there is as much sense in demanding that French, the language of a conquered people, be made, with Eng-

**BACK TO THE GARDEN.**

Prof. Adam Shortt, of the Civil Service Commission, before the Canadian Club, of Woodstock, discussed some of the causes of higher living, and made some statements of special interest. The population was shifting to the cities. Why? The farmer was made more and more dependent upon the city for the things he needed. There was a time when he could make most of his requirements, and when the needs of the poor contributed to his household. Now these things he wants he gets, from the man who lives and works in cities, and he makes for this urban life by having and using as little help he can.

With regard to the higher prices that are paid for the articles men buy and must have, we quote from the Woodstock Sentinel-Review and from Mr. Shortt's address:

"In the past ten or fifteen years, the increase in the cost of things, which came from outside is about ten per cent., while things which are made in Canada have gone up from thirty per cent. to one hundred per cent. Clothing has gone up, but the price of wool in the web has not. The increased cost is due to the cost of labor, high rentals, and profits in Canada. Wheat grown in the west is delivered as bread on the Britishers' table at from ten per cent. to thirty per cent. less than it is in Ontario. Unless we balance up things and give better conditions to the country people we cannot expect the cost of living to go down. The farmer though prices have gone up, does not get

**RETURN OF CLAYTON**

TO "WET" COLUMN ASSURES FRONTENAC REBUILDING.

At Round Island—The Hotel Will be Ready in 1913—Red Granite to be Used in the Construction.

Clayton, N.Y., Nov. 14.—Now that it has been decided Clayton will again enter the "wet" column next year, the rebuilding of the Hotel Frontenac is taken for granted, as before election it was given out that the aristocratic hostelry would only be rebuilt if Clayton voted for hotel license.

Most of the ruins have been cleaned up, and work will probably soon be commenced for preparation of rebuilding. It is understood that the fine red granite which is obtained from the quarries of the Pictou Island Red Granite company, and which are owned by C. G. Emery, who is also the principal stockholder in the Round Island company, which owned the old Frontenac. The plans, said to have been drawn, are reported to call for a four-story building of absolutely fireproof construction, and this fact alone will greatly add to the desirability of the hotel, for but very few of the summer hotels are of fireproof construction, being mostly of a flimsy wooden material and nothing more than fire traps.

If the work of rebuilding is commenced at once and pushed with all rapidity, a new structure cannot be completed for use next season. The annex is left yet, and if a temporary kitchen and dining room should be built, this building would accommodate 100 guests. This, together with the power plant and girls' dormitory, which are left, would make a large establishment, although it seems insignificant as compared with the hotel that stood there.

For the last several years the name of the Hotel Frontenac has been closely associated with all mention of the Thousand Islands. This hotel was noted far and wide as an aristocrat among hostelries, and by far surpassed any other hotel on the St. Lawrence, both in size and patronage. It was also noted for its fine golf grounds and facilities for aquatic sports, and also fronted one of the finest motor boat race courses on the river, and the Frontenac Yacht Club has always had the best boat in the races.
