CHANCES SEEM SLIM

FOR A WINNING O.H.A. SENIOR TEAM THIS SEASON.

Now that Marchand, Davidson and McCammon have Gone West—Kingston Makes No Effort to Keep its Star Players.

Now that the rugby season in both Intercollegiate and Interprovincial circles is over, the talk naturally turns to hockey, and as the first hockey jolt of the season Kingston fans are made aware of the fact that right here the chances of a senior O.H.A. team are mighty slim. The departure of Davidson and McCammon for the west, on Monday, took away the stonewall defence of the team which did so much to help the junior septette to victory during the past two years. It is quite likely that both men will go into "Tommy" Burns' newly-organized league there. McCammon has secured a position in Burns' men's furnishing store, while Davidson will work at his trade as machinist.

This has taken five of the last year's players away from the team, and unless "Jim" Sutherland can get some of the old material out again, the likelihood of a winning senior O.H.A. team this year is mighty slim. Hunt is with Queen's, Millan with Ottawa College, Marchand has gone to Cleveland, and the two recently departed ones have gone west. Kingston did not think enough of these two star players to see that they got good jobs, although Burns thought they were good enough to send a man down from Calgary to get them.

With five star players gone, what is left? Brouse as rover, Boyer on the left wing, and a possibility of Leo Williams coming down from Toronto as soon as the season starts for goal-keeper. Three men out of a team of seven of the fastest players who ever stood on skates. Hyland may be available for one defence position, but who could be obtained for the other side is not known. "Eddie" Hiscock could probably be induced to come out and guard the nets. While some people are looking for "Doc" Weicker to re-join the team, he is not so speedy as Millan, but he is a terrible back-checker and undoubtedly would be able to hold the wing position all right.

It is understood that "Reg" Crawford and George Richardson are available for the team, and with this material at hand, if they will work together, a team should be pulled together that would make a good showing. It is too early to conjecture what will be done in the way of pulling the team together, and the fans who supported the team so loyally during the last two years that they were victorious, will await with interest the first ice in the rink.

No City League Basketball.

A Farming Doctor.

Perth Courier.
A year or two ago, Dr. J. D. Lal-ferty, of Calgary, and Perth boy, bought a thousand acres of land in the Pincher Creek district, and broke it up for seeding, and last year put it all in fall wheat. This fall he harvested the crop, and indications point to a yield of thirty-five to forty bushels per acre, or say a total of 37,000 bushels. This year a wealthy Englishman joined him in the farming business, adding 800 acres to the plot as his share. This fall the whole 1,800 acres have been sown in fall wheat, with chances for the same abundant yield per acre. This should net the enterprising doctor and his partner a snug little fortune each harvest. The Pincher Creek country is a section of the old ranch districts, which the ranchers strove to keep for themselves purely as a horse and cattle raising country, and when the Laurier government, a few years ago opened it up for homesteading and to the farming, the ranchers raised a great outcry, denying its fitness for agriculture. And yet look at the results, as above.

DUTY OF THE PEOPLE

IS TO SUPPORT THE NEW HOTEL PROJECT.

The City Has Everything to Gain and Nothing to Lose in Guaranteeing the Bonds of the Hotel Company.

One of the most important measures in the history of Kingston will be submitted to the people on Thursday for their approval or disapproval. For years the want of a modern, up-to-date hotel in Kingston has been sadly felt. The injury inflicted to Kingston's advancement cannot be estimated. We know of at least one large business concern that may leave Kingston unless better hotel accommodation is secured. The executive will simply not come to Kingston unless better accommodation is provided.

For twelve long years a number of patriotic and devoted citizens realizing the great loss sustained by Kingston for want of hotel accommodation, have been struggling faithfully to remove this shame and want. Hardly a year of these twelve has passed but in precious time and labor has been expended on the hotel project. There were many difficulties in the way. The great difficulty was to secure a proper site. Time and again the project failed, because a location could not be secured. Three years ago twenty-nine of these men who labored long and had faith in their city, bought the Carruthers lot, paying therefor twenty-two thousand five hundred dollars cash. In addition to this they are now putting in an additional twenty thousand dollars necessary to purchase the fifty thousand of stock in the new hotel. For this they are getting scrip, good only when the city's bond guarantee is satisfied. It is not often that civic faith and devotion has gone further than this.

The by-law declares that the city of Kingston shall be represented on the new hotel bond by its city solicitor, at present D. M. McIntyre. The Kingston Board of Trade will also have a representative on the hotel board. Under the careful direction of these representatives, the interests of the citizens will be well guarded. It is utterly impossible that now or at any time the city can lose one cent by the transaction.

Home for Christmas.
From enquiries made at the railway stations it would appear as if quite a number from Kingston and vicinity will leave to spend Christmas in the old-country. Many have been making enquiries as to rates, etc., and it is believed that the passenger list will be quite heavy. In these days, when trips are made across to the old country in such short time, people take the advantage of a trip over for Christmas.

The Price of Eggs.
In a discussion on the high cost of living, it was said that eggs would be more expensive this winter than ever before. The enquiry the Whig learned that, as far as conditions are at present, this is untrue. Packed eggs, at the present time, are retailing at 25c. or 30c., while fresh eggs retail at 35c. or 36c. The local dealers import great quantities from Montreal and Toronto, and the supply is by no means limited. There is no reason why eggs should be scarcer and dearer this winter than formerly. They are dear enough, however.

Have Faith in Kingston.
Other cities and towns are busy granting exemption, giving cash bonuses, setting aside free sites for industrial purposes and are going ahead increasing the population and enhancing the value of property. Kingston cannot afford to remain idle. A new hotel is a much desired step. No one on Thursday is asked to vote a dollar of money or to increase the taxes by a fraction of a mill. Electors are asked to guarantee a bond issue which is fully protected by land and by buildings. There can be no loss, no failure in any way.
