WILL LEAVE QUEEN'S

IF HE WINS ELECTION IN PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

Prof. Alexander Macphail of School of Mining is a Candidate in Bye-Elections—Is Slated for Minister of Agriculture.

Prof. Alexander Macphail, of Queen's school of mining, is a candidate in the fourth district of Queen's county, Prince Edward Island, in the bye-elections taking place in that province today. Prince Edward Island is his native province, and he is largely interested there. Prof. Macphail has been in his constituency for the past two weeks. His opponent is Frederick J. Nash, editor of the Charlottetown Patriot, and a liberal. Prof. Macphail, though nominated by the conservatives, announces himself as an independent. It is understood that in case he wins, he is slated for the position of minister of agriculture in the Palmer government. This would mean that he would resign his position in the School of Mining.

After the Prince Edward Island house prorogued last May, Premier Howard accepted a judgeship, making the seat in the fourth district vacant. Hon. H. J. Palmer was appointed attorney-general and premier, thus automatically vacating his seat in the third district. Premier Palmer is opposed by Mr. Dewar, of South Port, near Charlottetown. When the house adjourned, the standing of the parties was sixteen to fourteen, and the outcome of today's battle is being awaited with much interest.

STORMHOUND ON ISLAND.

Two Kingston Hunters Had a Thrilling Experience.

Robert Duncan, the crack second baseman of the Victorias, and a friend of his, have a story to tell of being shipwrecked on a desolate island down the river during the early part of the week. It seems that the two left the city on Sunday to do down the St. Lawrence on a shooting expedition. Everything went along all right until the wind started to come up at a pretty good rate. They had gone as far as what is called the Specks, when they were storm bound. The boys' provisions consisted of ten potatoes and two tin cans of beans, which had to last them for about two days. The worst thing of the whole trip was that they did not shoot anything, and, therefore, had nothing else to eat. The island where they were is a very desolate one, there not being even a house of any kind on it. They pitched their tent and remained until the wind went down enough to enable them to get home. The boys say that they will never forget the experience they had. The sea that was rolling on the day they were on the island was awful.

three-fifths clause. The permanency of the law was not guaranteed by that majority, but by the success of local opinion when it was put into practice, he added. The other definite promise was to remove altogether the administration of the license system, while it was retained, from political influence. "They have utterly failed to discharge their duty to the people of this province," was a statement which received approval concerning the administration of New Ontario by the government, when Mr. Howell made a skillful and extensive criticism of the spathy, which had characterized the development of the hinterland.

ADVICE TO CITIZENS

BY H. W. RICHARDSON TO VOTE FOR BY-LAW.

Mr. Richardson Shows Some of the Advantages That Will Result—The City Will Gain in Taxes Alone.

Kingston, Nov. 15.—(To the Editor): I wish a word with the property owners of the city of Kingston. Tomorrow you will be asked to vote on a by-law for the purpose of creating a first-class hotel in this city. The city is asked to guarantee the bonds of the company to the extent of \$100,000. The company guarantees to erect a hotel costing not less than \$180,000, exclusive of the value of the land. Therefore, you have double security for your guarantee, such security as any ordinary loan company will gladly take.

You are safeguarded by having an architect of your own pass upon the work as it progresses, and no money will be handed over to the hotel company until your architect certifies that the work has been accomplished, and then only fifty per cent of that will be paid over. In other words the hotel company will provide money themselves for the other fifty per cent. You are absolutely protected. You are not called upon to advance this money, as the company takes over the bonds which you have guaranteed and places them in a trust company, which sells them to the public and holds the proceeds to your order.

At the present time this property is only paying a small tax, somewhere about \$800 a year. It is proposed to tax it for \$20,000, making \$19,200 a year in taxes coming into the city, and also a school tax for whatever extra valuation the assessor places on the property.

So instead of the city of Kingston running any risk or losing any money, it is absolutely guaranteed against risk, and will receive a profit approximately of \$1,000 a year.

As the needs are very great for a hotel of this class in Kingston, I can see no reason anyone should hesitate about voting for this, but quite the reverse—that they not only should vote for it, but also assist in every way possible to have the by-law carried.

I feel sure if this hotel is built in Kingston that it will materially help the growth of our city, and put us in a very much better position with the other cities of Canada than we are at present.

I trust that every loyal citizen of the city will come out and support this by-law at the polls to-morrow.
