HUDSON BAY DIFFICULTY.

A most discouraging report is that which Mr. Jackson, a member of the Dominion Meteorological Department, hands out as a result of his visit to Hudson's Bay during the summer.

This was in August, the middle of the open season, and yet the difficulties from ice, with a leaky ship, were so great that nothing practically was accomplished.

FARMER IN PARLIAMENT.

MARINE NOTES.

The Arrivals and Departures at This Port. The steamer Simla passed up this afternoon, to Port Colborne, to load grain for Montreal.

A number of vessels which have been tied up for a few days, but the weather is still reported to be very rough. At 5:15 a.m. the steamer Belleville arrived from her winter trip, over a day late in her trip, steamer Althea down from bay ports to-day.

The steamer Alexandria passed down on her way to Montreal, on Thursday morning, heavily laden with freight. She did not call at Folger's wharf. The next trip is expected to be her last.

The barge Locke, well known in this port, was sunk in the Murray canal, while coal-laden and towed by the steamer John Rolph. The barge struck a dredge, which caused the accident. The barge was raised.

The steamer Ames arrived at Port Arthur with a very bad list, caused by her cargo shifting while on the bay. For a time it was feared that she would turn turtle and it was with great difficulty that she reached port.

The tug Frontenac, of Calvin's fleet, after working all day Wednesday with the Montreal Transportation company's barges at Howe Island, was unable to get them off, and went down again this morning. The barges are on very hard. They went ashore when the water was a foot and a half higher than it is now and they have settled on the beach. The tug will have a job to release them.

M. T. Co's elevator, Steamer McKinnon cleared for Belleville, to load cement for Fort Williams steamer. Advance arrived, light from Montreal, and cleared for Montreal, with a cargo of grain; tug Bronson arrived up light, and cleared for Montreal with two grain barges; tug Hall arrived from Montreal, with three light barges, and cleared for Montreal with one grain barge and one oil barge.

FLYSHEETS SCATTERED.

Its Statements Misleading or Untrue—Many Surprises. As was expected a fly-sheet in red and black ink, and anonymous in character, setting forth objections to the hotel by-law, was scattered through the city last night after the papers had gone to press and when reply was impossible. A series of reasons are given that are quite misleading, untrue, or simply surprises.

An extravagant amount, \$2,000, is given as the cost for submitting the by-law. The charge that the city papers are subsidized with printing, to the extent of about \$200, to support the scheme, whether it is good or bad, is simply contemptible.

The Whig, interested in the development of Kingston, found the proposition about the best in years that has been presented for the consideration of property owners and, therefore, supported it. The space it had freely given to further the project, if charged for, would be worth four times the amount received for printing and advertising.

So far as the Whig is concerned its attitude on any issue is not purchasable. We have published by-law and opposed the passing of them but in this case we were confident that the hotel was much desired and the proposition for securing it reasonable and safe.

Cheap Peat Fuel.

Ottawa Journal. Dr. Eugene Hamel, director of the department of mines, states that the cost of the peat fuel in stacks, including interest on capital invested, amortization, oil and repairs, was \$1.70 per ton, and that with only about five per cent of ash, it could be manufactured at a cost of considerably under \$1 for an amount having the same calorific value as a ton of imported anthracite.
