CADETS DO NOT GO TO MONTREAL TILL NEXT WEEK.

Grounds for Game Could Not be Secured for Saturday—Queen's Soccer Team Has Gone to Toronto.

The Royal Military College intermediate rugby team won't go to Montreal to play M.A.A.A. champions of the province of Quebec. This is due to the fact that the grounds will be occupied on Saturday and arrangements were unable to be made where the Kingston boys could get their game in. The boys were practicing faithfully every day, pending arrangements, but at the last moment it was found impossible to obtain the grounds. They will go down next week.

Game Was a Tie. The rugby game Thursday afternoon between two Queen's teams, years 15 and 13, was a draw, the final score being fourteen to fourteen. The freshmen were victorious in their game against the sophomores, but the husky bunch that the third year men turned out was more than they could trim. The game was a beautiful exhibition of the real game and a large crowd of interested spectators were present for both factors.

Queen's Soccer Team. Kingston will be represented by another team desirous of championship honors, but the scene will be laid in Toronto on Saturday and the other leading actor will be Toronto University soccer team. At the present time the Presbyterians are one point ahead of Varsity and should they do nothing more than tie Varsity they will have the championship. If they win it's theirs sure. On the other hand, Toronto must win to get the championship.

Conditions of things at the present time look good for the boys from the Limestone City. They are depending on hard ground to help them considerably and if the cold spell hangs on for another day they will have their wish. Toronto, while not working as well on soft ground, depends on long drives to score for them, while Queen's can score in spite of the opposing team on their pretty combination work.

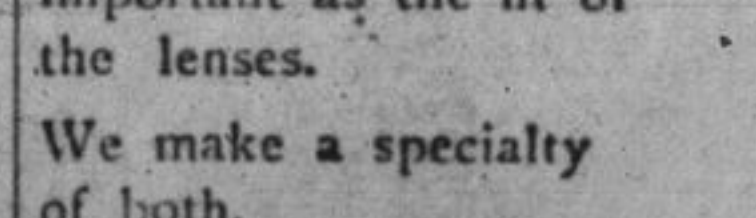
