MADOLE AGAIN CHOICE

AS THE LIBERAL CANDIDATE IN LENNOX.

He Was Chosen at a Convention on Thursday—Mrs. W. H. Hunter, of Napanee, Broke Her Arm.

Napanee, Nov. 17.—The town hall was well filled yesterday afternoon with an enthusiastic gathering of liberals, who had met together to nominate a candidate to contest the riding in the coming provincial election. H. B. Sherwood, president of the liberal association, called the meeting to order and after outlining the purpose of the gathering and making a short address on the coming campaign, called for nominations for a candidate to represent the liberals of Lennox.

The following gentlemen were nominated: Messrs. R. W. Longmore, Camden East; Charles Anderson, Oerton; M. S. Madole, Napanee, and C. W. Neville, Swartzville. Short addresses were delivered by Messrs. T. Symington and W. T. Gilkard in behalf of the candidates nominated.

Messrs. Longmore, Neville and Anderson expressed themselves as being willing to retire in favor of M. S. Madole, and the gathering, by a standing vote unanimously chose M. S. Madole as the liberal standard-bearer.

Mr. Madole accepted the nomination as a compliment at the hands of his fellow-citizens and in a rousing address discussed the questions and issues of the present campaign. Mr. Madole paid a high tribute to the sterling worth of the liberal leader, N. W. Rowell.

Every polling division in the community was well represented and from the many encouraging reports received Mr. Madole's chances of success seemed exceedingly bright. Mr. Madole as a concluding request asked that the liberals do all in their power to help him win in the coming election.
