THE BOARD OF WORKS

REFUSED TO CONSIDER CATARAQUI BRIDGE PURCHASE

As it is a Finance Committee Matter—Arranging for Road Metal—Another Steam Roller May be Purchased.

The board of works met Thursday evening, those present being: Ald. Gigney (chairman), Toye, Harrison, Carson, Clugston, Fraser, and Ald. Carson, referring to the dangerous condition of the walk on King street, between Erie and Earl streets, and the assistant engineer was instructed to have the walk repaired at once.

The chairman noted an advance of \$2,000 which had been made to the road constructing company.

A communication was read from a resident of Main street, complaining of the irregular numbering of that street. On motion of Ald. Carson, it was decided to have the said street renumbered.

Rodger & Wright, jewelers, applied to be permitted to erect a lamp post on the walk, close to the curb, in front of their store. These clocks are much in evidence in England, and keeping perfect time, are of great convenience to the public, as well as an ornament to the street. On motion of Ald. Carson, this matter was referred to council for decision.

A communication was received from the mayor, regarding the purchase of a cataraqui bridge, with the request that the chairman report at next meeting of council, as to putting a by-law for the sanction of the voters in January, for the purchase of the bridge. The Exploration Syndicate's request for a sum being placed in the harbor was discussed by the chairman, Ald. Toye and Fraser. The matter of the purchase of the bridge had been in the hands of the finance committee, and never before the board of works. On motion of Ald. Harrison the matter of the purchase of the bridge was referred back to the finance committee, as that committee was in possession of all negotiations up to date.

It was thought advisable to have the street watering carts painted this fall, instead of in the spring, and it was moved by Ald. Clugston that tenders be asked for.

Discussion took place over the purchase of a steam roller and drill. The assistant engineer explained the need for the purchase, and he was instructed to get complete information regarding the same.

The chairman said the city for years back had, in the spring, been in want of sufficient stone to place on the streets at a time when it was most advantageous. To overcome this state of affairs Mr. McKow, the contractor, will be instructed to have an early supply on hand.

Another plan, proposed by Ald. Carson and the chairman, is to provide work for men in the winter, who are willing to break stone. In this way many out of work will be benefited, as well as a good supply will be on hand in the spring.

HOTEL BY-LAW RESULT

THE THREE-FIFTHS VOTE WAS NOT OBTAINED.

But it is Claimed the By-law Does Not Need It—The City Council Will be Asked to Ratify It.

The vote of the Kingston property holders on Thursday to guarantee a bond issue of \$400,000 to promote the erection of an hotel on the Carruthers' site on King street, resulted: For the by-law, 1,450; against the by-law, 297. The opposition was decidedly small.

Heretofore, the price of meals has been eleven cents. Hereafter, the guards will pay twelve and one-half cents, or at the rate of two meals for the quarter dollar.

STEAMER RAN AGROUND

WIND TOOK MCKINSTREY OUT OF HER COURSE.

Was on Her Way From Kingston to Belleville to Load Cement and Went on Near Telegraph Island—Several Grain Vessels on Their Way to This Port.

Carried out of her course by a heavy gale the steamer McKinstrey ran aground near Telegraph Island, near Deseronto, Thursday morning, on the way to Belleville to load cement.

The McKinstrey was on her way from Kingston where she unloaded a cargo of grain at the Montreal Transportation company's elevator. Owing to the fact that the vessel was running light it was a very easy matter for her to go aground.

The Donnelly Wrecking company was notified and on Friday morning sent a vessel to pull her off.

The steamer Keweenaw was in port on her way west. The new fire truck, manufactured here by James Laturney, for the Fort William fire department, was shipped on the Keweenaw.

Capt. John Corkey has returned to his home in this city after putting the government boat Bayfield in winter quarters at Prescott.

The steamer Sowards came in from the Cove this morning for another supply of coal. She had been held up so long in an endeavor to make across the lake that her supply of coal ran out.

The steamer Brockville passed down today on her way from Pictou to Brockville, loaded with a cargo of apples.

The steambarge Waterbury passed down on Thursday afternoon.

The steamers Dundas, Neopawah and Midland Queen are on the way to Kingston, from Fort William, and will lighter and go on to Montreal.

The steamer Bertha Calkins is at Richardson's wharf loading feldspar. Several cars of feldspar arrived from the mines this morning.

The government steamer Scout was in port and cleared for river ports.

His teachers include Edward Dufferin, the celebrated painter, now of the New York Art School; Lucius N. Hittcock, the well-known illustrator of Harper's Magazine; and Bernard Carpenter, one of the best living designers."
