THE SPORT REVIEW

MCGILL AND MONTREAL PLAY RUGBY TO-DAY.

Comparison of Toronto Argonauts and Hamilton Alerts—Hockey Will Boom in Buffalo and Cleveland.

Brantford will not allow any professional boxing.

Hockey will boom in Buffalo this season. A city league has been organized and games will be played on outdoor rinks.

There will be a Montreal city championship game after all, the McGill and M.A.A.A. teams having arranged to play a match on the grounds, at the latter to-day.

Regina is gathering up Eastern hockey players for an amateur team. They have secured "Jack" Williams, of Ottawa. A couple of Toronto men are being angled for.

Hockey games are already being played at Cleveland. There will be no local league, but Canadian teams will be taken over for exhibition games. The Cleveland high schools have a league.

The Ottawa hockey club will make an effort at Saturday's meeting of the National Hockey Association, to secure the services of Fred Taylor, from the Montreal Wanderers.

At the Varsity rugby club executive meeting, a resolution was passed, strongly disapproving of the policy of men playing on inter-city and city teams in preference to university teams. In future any men violating this principle will be debarred from playing in university teams.

There is but little difference in weights between the Toronto Argos and Hamilton Alerts. On the wing line there is only thirty-four pounds. In the scrimmage Argos are heavier, but Alerts are heavier at outside wing and at inside wing.

The new international hockey league mentioned so often is almost completed, unofficially of course, but it will not be ready and in working order till next season, the one of 1912-13. The teams as far as can be ascertained at present to be taken in are Chicago, Buffalo, Detroit, Boston, Cleveland and four Canadian teams representing Ottawa, Toronto and Montreal.

MR. LANCASTER IS ON THE WARPATH

Gives Notice of Bills That Will Embarrass the Government.

Ottawa, Nov. 17.—A. E. Lancaster, whose cabinet aspirations were rudely squelched by Mr. Borden, has given notice of several bills which will prove embarrassing to the government. He has placed on the order paper his resolution of last session, providing for senate reform by the abolition route. Incidentally it may be noted that another step towards "senate reform" was consummated yesterday, when Messrs. George Taylor and Rufus Pope, M.P.'s, were introduced and took their seats in the upper chamber.

Mr. Lancaster will ask the government to handle another live wire by introducing a bill to amend the marriage act. Premier Borden will consequently be asked by one of his own followers to choose between his Orange and nationalist supporters in regard to the less temperate decree.

Mr. Lancaster is also out again with his hardy annual—the bill for the abolition of level crossings. He also has a resolution urging immediate action on the deepening of the Welland canal to twenty-five feet.

The seed was threshed from about fifteen loads. Mr. Ford drew it with a span of grey horses for which he refused \$575, when hitching to go home, but he refused anything less than the even \$600.

New York, Nov. 18.—Twin sisters, eighty-two years old, Mrs. Eva L. Eno and Mrs. Ada L. Sanford, of New Britain, Conn., were found dead from gas asphyxiation, at the home of their niece, Mrs. J. E. Humason, of Brooklyn, whom they had come to visit over Thanksgiving day. The gas heater in their bedroom had been accidentally left open.

CONFIDED IN MAN.

He Now Admits Tarring and Feathering Girl.

Lincoln Center, Kansas, Nov. 18.—An admission of guilt in the "tar party" case came yesterday. Edward Ricard, a barber, admitted that he coerced Miss Mary Chamberlain, a school teacher, to a point near Shady Bend, where she was "tarred" on August seventh. He went before Judge Dallas Glover, and entered a plea of guilty. Sentence was suspended until after the trial of the other accused men.

Ricard has been in jail for the last three months awaiting action on appeal from a justice court sentence, of one year for complicity in the attack on Miss Chamberlain. It is alleged he received five dollars for his part in the "tar party."

According to Miss Chamberlain she accompanied Ricard on the night of the attack under the impression that he was taking her to a dance.
