THE CRUEL ARABS

GENERAL CANEVA TELLS OF MUTILATION OF SOLDIERS.

Women Stone the Troops—Leader of Italian Forces in Tripoli, Charges Also, That Turks are Using the "Dum-dum" Bullets.

New York, Nov. 18.—General Caneva, commanding the Italian forces in Tripoli, sends the following message to the International News service:

"Tripoli, Nov. 16.—You may inform the newspapers that the only reproach we feel is that of excessive clemency and benevolence towards the natives here. By public proclamation and orders to all troops of the Italian government we have directed our soldiers to treat the Arabs in a friendly manner and to respect their traditions."

"I have distributed hundreds of tons of grain and barley to the starving population, paid ten lire for each rifle delivered by the Arabs and compensated generously all native labor."

"Our generosity, amounting almost

to ingenuousness, induced us to even return firearms to Arabs who passed across our trenches undistracted."

"On October 23rd, Turkish regulars with 8,000 Arabs armed with Mandy rifles, attacked our front line, supported by Arabs from the town across the oasis. Suddenly there was firing behind the Italians. Many soldiers were killed. A Red Cross ambulance was attacked. Numerous wounded men were horribly mutilated. Women huddled stones from roofs on the Italian patrols. Isolated soldiers were merely massacred."

"It then became necessary to protect ourselves, besides other Europeans. I ordered the instant shooting of the rebels and the arrest of Arabs carrying arms."

"I have certainly not exaggerated the repression. The proof of this exists in the fact that the correspondents of all nations were allowed to assist in the operations and go everywhere. Even Bassous Pasha admitted the necessity of acting as I did."

"I must also state that the Turks used dum-dum bullets and let loose on Tripoli troops of fanatics preaching holy war."

"The decapitated bodies of Italian soldiers were found in the oasis, where shots are continually fired against the Red Cross hospitals. The whole of the world should admire the exemplary conduct of our soldiers, who respect the women and protect the children. (Signed) CANEVA."

SMALLER WARSHIPS.

Sir W. H. White Favours More Moderate Dimensions.

New York, Nov. 18.—Smaller battleships and cruisers were advocated by Sir William H. White, former chief constructor of the British Navy, at an address before the annual meeting of the Society of Naval Architects and Marine Engineers. Sir William is acknowledged to be one of the world's foremost naval architects.

"My personal convictions, based on long continued study of the problem," he said, "is that the war course in warship building would be best served by smaller, well-protected, steady gun platforms, capable of fighting their guns in all weathers when actions could take place, and able to maintain their speed in rough water."

"The value of high speed to capital ships has been much discussed, but it really opens up a separate field into which it would be undesirable to enter now."

"Since it is to say, that with equal speed a reduction in the number of heavy guns carried in a single ship would enable considerable reductions to be made in size and cost,

and that, for a given total expenditure on the first cost of a fleet or squadron, a more formidable and flexible force could, in my judgment, be obtained, with greatly reduced risks from either gunfire underwater or torpedoes or magazine explosions."

"In regard to merchant ships, Sir White said that the upper limit of size has been reached for capital ships but it really opens up a separate field into which it would be undesirable to enter now."

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THEY BROKE PLEDGES

MONTREAL METHODISTS CRITICISE PRESBYTERIANS.

They Declare That Services in McDonald College Were Made Presbyterian After Unionism Was Promised.

Montreal, Nov. 18.—Although the Presbyterians were gathered together only fifty yards away from where the Methodists were assembled in a denominational meeting, yesterday, it was much better that even that short distance intervened than that they should have been together.

The Methodists said some things about the Presbyterians which were far from complimentary. They accused their sister denomination of a breach of faith in one specific instance, at least, that of McDonald College, and a number of the speakers gave expression to opinions that the Presbyterians were a systematically faithless body in their interdenominational meetings with the Methodists.

Two speakers criticized the action taken by the presbytery of Montreal on Tuesday last, when that body authorized the organization at McDonald College. These speakers said that the Presbyterians and Methodists had entered into an agreement by which the religious services at the college

were to be held in the same room, the day before yesterday it was said, the presbytery had received a petition from McDonald College with seventy signatures asking that purely Presbyterian services be instituted for them, and the presbytery had granted this request directly in the face of an agreement not to do anything of the kind.

U.S. FARM AND FOREST.

BALANCE ON EIGHT SIDE IN IMPORTS AND EXPORTS.

Washington, Nov. 18.—There was a balance of \$2,300,000 on the right side of the ledger in the government account during the past fiscal year of its imports and exports of farm and forest products. While it imported \$638,000,000 worth of these products, it exported \$891,000,000 worth.

The value of the farm products imported during the year was greater by \$75,000,000 than the average for the five years 1906 to 1910. The value of imported forest products exceeded those of any previous year, totaling \$170,000,000, an increase of \$55,000,000 over the preceding year. \$39,000,000 of this increase being due to India rubber.

FEAR CEMENT WALK WILL BAR MESSIAH

Dowries Alarmed—Last Christ Avoided

Stone Paved Streets of Zion City.

Zion City, Ill., Nov. 18.—Cement sidewalks will be the means of denying to residents of Zion City, a visit from Christ on his approaching second advent. So runs the warning of Rupert Devreux, champion of the old Dowie theories, who yesterday filed a formal complaint with the board of aldermen. Christ walked on the water, but he never would walk on a hard cement pathway, declares Devreux.

Original Dowie adherents have been much wrought up over late over the "second coming of Christ," and in addition to putting themselves in a proper spiritual state of mind they have insisted that the physical condition of their earthly dwelling place be in accordance with the requirements of the "second coming of Christ."

Devreux and his fellow believers expect Alexander Dowie to pay them a visit at the same time they have announced Christ will appear, and the founder of Zion City also would be greatly offended by modern flagstones, they declare.

MORAL HOPE OF UNIVERSE.

Watertown, Nov. 18.—In an address delivered at services of dedication at the First Christian church here, H. Watterson, editor of the "Courier-Journal," paid his respects to journalists, statesmen and ministers, saying:

"I shall have all ministers of religion as free to discuss the things of this world as the statesmen and the journalists; but with this difference, that the objective point with them shall be the regeneration of man through the grace of God, and not the winning of offices or the exploitation of parties and newspapers."

"Journalism is yet too ripe to more than guess at truth from a single side. The statesman stands mainly for political organization. Until he dies he is suspected of the moral compass of the universe and in spiritual light of mankind."

"It must be non-partisan. It must be manly and independent. But it must also be worldly-wise, not artificial, sympathetic, broad-minded, and magnified, easily ready to unite strong in the mighty and kind to the lowly and the poor, the weak and the afflicted."

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
