OUTLINE GIVEN Of the Programme of the Chinese Rebels

MILITARY GOVERNMENT UNDER DIRECTION OF AN AMERICAN GENERAL

To be Tried for Six Years--Then There Will be a Republican Government--Plan of Rebel Attack on Nankin.

London, Nov. 20. Archibald Ross of Johnson, well-known as a journalist and explorer, in an article in the Daily Graphic, proposes to outline the programme of the Chinese rebels in the authority of the leaders of the revolution, says the revolutionary committee has summoned Dr. Sun Yat-sen, one of the instigators of the present revolt, and that he shortly will arrive in Shanghai, to take up the direction of affairs.

Duluth, Minn., Nov. 20. The passengers spent the night on the car tops and when rescued were almost frozen to death.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier achieved his seventieth milestone to-day, and the membership of the greatest opposition which Canada has ever seen has asked him to accept resignation of the seat in the House of Commons. The "chief" prefers to spend the day fighting. The debate upon the address is scheduled to begin Monday afternoon, Mr. Bennett, of Alberta, and Mr. Seigny, of Quebec, will be the protagonists of the address.

Leary, president of the Peterboro industrial exhibition, and one of the best-known residents of the city, died suddenly of heart failure at his residence, 182 McDonald street, on Saturday night. He had apparently been in the best of health during the day.

Macdonald, of Toronto, used Canada as an illustration, saying that voters were swayed by the intelligent emotion of the crowd when they rejected reciprocity. He said Canada had now returned to sober thinking, and was sorry she rejected reciprocity and was in a repentant mood.

DR. JAMES DOUGLAS HAS GIVEN \$100,000

Archbishop Bruchesi declares that Miss Graham, subscribing to an agreement, submitted by the Roman Catholic church when she married young Shaughnessy.
