WAS NIPPED IN THE BUD

ATTEMPT TO KIDNAP NINE-YEAR-OLD LAD.

Father Objected to Relative Taking Boy, and Had Warrant Issued—Boy Was Taken to Outer Station to Leave on Train—Constable Bateson Secured Lad.

Police Constable James Bateson nipped in the bud on Monday night, a plan which had been laid to kidnap a nine-year-old boy.

The lad, so it appears, comes of a very respectable family. When just a year old, his mother died, and he was given over into the care of a relative. This relative gave up keeping house, just a few days ago, and, therefore, there was no home for the boy. Another relative, a young man, was very fond of the boy, and as he was leaving for the states, on Monday night, he wanted to take the boy away with him. But the father would not give his consent.

However, the young man decided that he would take the law into his own hands, as the saying goes. He got the boy, and went out to the outer junction, and was all in readiness to take the train when Constable Bateson and the father of the lad appeared on the scene, and secured possession of the lad, and the relative was foiled in his attempt to get away with the boy.

The father got a tip to the fact that the young man intended to take the boy away, and going to the police station, he secured a warrant for the young man's arrest. Armed with the warrant, Constable Bateson was just in time. The young fellow did not want to give up the boy, but when he was told that he would either have to give him up, or go to the police station, he was quite willing to submit to the law. The lad was then handed over to the father, and the young man was allowed to take his train.

DELIVERED AN ADDRESS

On Baptist Missions in Western Provinces.

Rev. W. Daniel, representing the western missions, gave a very interesting address before the young people's society of the First Baptist church Monday evening.

The growth of the west is phenomenal. Ten years ago the population was 700,000. Today it is over a million. Small villages of ten years ago are now thriving cities. Among other places Saskatoon was mentioned. Ten years ago it was a village of 113 people. Today it is a city of some thirteen or fourteen thousand. It has become a busy railroad centre. It has its hospital and its splendid school buildings, and has become the seat of the Saskatchewan university. It seems impossible for Christian work to keep pace with the great growth of the population. In these provinces there are 220 Baptist churches with an aggregate membership of 16,000, but with them, as with others, there are thousands of their people who are untaught, unshepherded. There is a great need for pastors to care for these scattered ones, as well as to meet the great influx of foreign people.
