NATIONAL LABORATORY NEEDED.

One finds an echo of the second annual report of the Conservation Commission, held in June last, in Ottawa, when he reads the article from M. J. Patten in last week's Canadian Courier. The article deals with this country's need of a national laboratory, and he makes this need keenly felt by the recitation of certain important facts. At the outset he remarks upon the fact that a Health of Animals' branch has been established in connection with the Department of Agriculture. It is equipped with a laboratory and manned by skilled officials, to look after the health of the cattle and pigs of the country. "But somehow or other," says Mr. Patten, "in our anxiety to raise cattle and pigs we have overlooked the need of a national laboratory for human beings." And yet, the need for it is very great. Last year in Ontario there was an epidemic of rabies and many of the unfortunates who chanced to be bitten had to be huddled off in haste to New York for treatment.

Then, too, we are dependent on the United States for all our vaccines, anti-toxins and sera for treating such diseases as smallpox, diphtheria, meningitis and lockjaw. And what is worse, it seems that the biological products we get from the United States are often of poor quality or strength. All such products in the United States must be of a certain standard of purity. In Canada there is no standard, and so it gets in its

YOUNG MEN TRIUMPHANT.

The report of the special committee on civic consolidation has been presented to the council, and adopted. It was amplified somewhat after the meeting of the committee some days ago. He must have a chance to make himself familiar with the conditions in the water department, and Mr. Hewitt will probably be very helpful in smoothing the way to a successful management before he leaves the city's service.

DEPARTMENT AT FAULT.

The Ottawa Citizen does not discuss the question of medical inspection fairly, when it seeks to remit to the municipality, or the board of education, the entire responsibility of dealing with this subject. The Education Department, has not, as Mr. Rowell declares, performed its whole duty, when it empowers trustees to have dental and medical inspection in the schools. That inspection can only be made effective when the teachers are trained to co-operate with the nurses and the doctors, and the Education Department is very faulty in its work.

NOT A FAIR DEAL

WHY SOME PUBLIC SCHOOL BOOKS ARE CHEAPER.

The Difference in Price Paid by the Government—The Benefit Eaton & Co. Are Getting—Building Up a Toronto Business at the Local Men's Expense.

From time to time the Despatch has called public attention to the fact that Eaton's and Simpson's were getting the money that should find its way into the pockets of our local business men. Those who thus display their lack of the civic spirit are in very good company. Even the Ontario government is out for Eaton and against the local trader.

Have you noticed that every reader used in our schools has the advertisement—"Eaton & Co."—in big type on the front page? We wonder what the good conservatives of Campbellford and all the other towns throughout the province think of this little arrangement to help to boost Eaton, as against the local trader?

The mail order system of the big Toronto firm makes inroads into the business of every merchant in every village, town and city outside Toronto. And it is greatly encouraged in this direction by the action of the Whitney government. School readers, instead of being purchased through retail merchants in cities, towns and villages, are ordered by mail from T. Eaton & Co. The local merchants not only lose trade but the profit of the trade, but they have to contribute their share to paying the advertisement of a rival firm.

Now, if it is wrong for local purchasers to deal with Eaton in preference to the merchants who live in town and helps to pay the taxes of the town, surely it is no less wrong for the Whitney government to boost this great concern to the detriment of the smaller merchants. Perhaps our local traders would instruct Mr. Sam Nesbitt to ask a question or two in the house about the matter.

It is objected that the readers are now supplied at a cheaper rate, let us remember that the government now pays the entire cost of the readers, except the mere printing of the books, whereas formerly the books were produced by the legitimate employment of the printing trade and book sellers had a fair chance with each other in gaining a profit. We have cheap school books, it is true, but they are practically printed out of the public funds, distributed through a great commercial concern, which is given very valuable advertising advantages which are not paid for on commercial terms, at the expense of the business interests of the country at large.

We say "at the expense of the business interests of the country at large," because the prosperity of the country depends upon the prosperity of its parts, and the parts must suffer if Toronto is to get everything that is going. No town is prosperous unless everyone of its business interests are prosperous. This gospel of local trade does not only concern the local trader—it should be of interest to all. The money that goes into the pockets of the local merchant will come out again into the hands of the local farmer and workman. The money that goes to Eaton will come out in the smoke of his private yacht.
