**THE WORLD'S EPISODES ATTACK GOVERNMENT**

**WHICH SITS SILENT UNDER LIBERAL FUSILLADE.**

The Ministers Were Much Embarrassed—F. B. Carvell Declared That Canada Must Have Larger Markets.

Ottawa, Nov. 22.—Parliament is sitting up and taking notice. It finds the benches to the left of Mr. Speaker, peopled by an opposition that is respected and feared; a company of resolute and experienced politicians, led by the master parliamentary tactician and statesman. It seems the big battalions of governmental strength are more than met by superiority in debating power and in vigor and confidence of attack.

There were no preliminaries. Stimulated and enthused by the inspiring generalship of the "Old Chief," the opposition promptly renewed the attack when the house met yesterday, and kept the government manifestly embarrassed, ill at ease, and on the defensive throughout.

The issue for which reciprocity stood in the recent campaign, the securing of larger markets for the Canadian producer, was not dead, declared F. B. Carvell, who resumed the debate on the address in reply to the speech from the throne. "I care not what you call it," said he. "The government which would loyally serve the interests of this great and growing Dominion must set itself to secure good markets for its increasing production." The policy of raising tariff barriers higher and higher could not ultimately survive.

Hon. Mr. Foster interrupted. "It is not necessary," said he, "to place a large protection on imports to make a home market."

"I am glad to have this intimation from the minister, that there is to be no increase in tariff, at any rate," responded the New Brunswick liberal.

This brought Mr. Foster to his feet again with alacrity. "I did not say that," he observed, amid liberal laughter.

"Ah," observed Mr. Carvell, smiling. "I thought the hon. gentleman had gone further than he intended."

Proceeding, he arraigned the government for conducting an election campaign, based upon race and religious prejudices, and dealing with the naval question, scored the composition of the national-conservative cabinet.

"Henry Bourassa is the master of the present administration," he declared. "It is absolutely and abjectly under the control of the national party. The premier has confessed that he does not know what he is going to do. Let me tell him. He is going to do just what his nationalist masters tell him; he is going to do nothing. The politician is the refuge of a government which cannot make up its mind. It puts Canada in a position of humiliation before the eyes of the world."

Hon. Mr. Hazen asked time for the government to determine its naval policy. He stated that nine tenders had been received by the former government on May 1st last for four cruisers and six destroyers. The lowest tender was that of Campbell & Laird, Great Britain, for \$11,280,000. He believed the real reason for the failure to award the contract, was the knowledge, that six years hence, when these ships would have been completed, they would be obsolete and unfit for actual warfare. The minister closed by promising a naval policy in the interests of Canada and in the interests of the empire.

**PLACED UNDER ARREST**

**ON A CHARGE OF STABBING**

**ARTHUR JOHNSON.**

James Campbell Was Arrested in Kingston on Tuesday Morning—Denies Having Used a Knife—Police Went to Arrest Him at Perth Road.

A few hours after County Constable Robert Smith and City Constable Alexander McLeod, left for the Perth Road, to place James Campbell under arrest, on a charge of stabbing Arthur Johnson, on Monday night, Sept. 25th, Lower Nesbitt and Constable James Bateson, came across the accused near Victoria Park, at the head of Brock street, placed him under arrest and locked him up at the police station. He will be brought before Justice of the Peace Hunter.

Campbell denies that he stabbed Johnson, but says he knows nothing whatever about Johnson being stabbed. He states further, that if he was stabbed, it must have been in a row with some other men at the railway camp.

Campbell stated that he left a note at the camp to inform the local police, when they arrived, that he and you to Kingston. Constables Smith and McLeod left early Wednesday morning for the camp.

It is understood, that Campbell stayed at a local hotel over night, having walked into the city, from the camp, late Tuesday afternoon. For an hour or so, after he was placed in the lock-up, he kept walking up and down the long corridor, mumbling to himself, and he is believed by a great many to be of unsound mind.

Johnson went to the general hospital for treatment. Tuesday afternoon, after he had a scurrilous row out for the arrest of Campbell. He was reported as doing badly, today. His case is not regarded as at all serious.

When confined at the police station, Campbell had a small sum of money, and a small cut knife in his possession.

**Committed For Trial.**  
On Wednesday afternoon, Campbell was brought before Justice of the Peace George Hunter, at the police station, and was committed to stand his trial at the court house, on Wednesday next, November 29th. D. M. McFadyen had in conference with the accused, and will appear as his counsel at the trial.

Constables Smith and McLeod returned from Perth Road early Wednesday afternoon. When they arrived at the railway camp they were informed that Campbell had gone to the city.

In the note which the accused left at the camp for the police, it is stated that he made the statement that he had gone to Kingston, and would be willing to give himself up, as he had many friends at the camp, and did not want to disgrace them.

Campbell had been working steadily at the camp for some time, not losing a day, and it was stated to-day that he had about \$175 coming to him in wages.

**TEACHERS MAY RESIGN**

**If They Do Not Get Increase in Salaries.**

There will be a meeting of the management committee of the board of education, to-night, when the members will again tackle the question of increase in salary for the school teachers. The management committee at its last meeting reported that the matter was under consideration.

It is understood that there is much dissatisfaction among the teachers, and that if the increase is not given, that the board will have quite a number of resignations at the end of the year. From what can be learned the committee is likely to recommend an increase, and the board will pass it.
