**AN ULTIMATUM ISSUED**

BY COUNTY COUNCIL TO IN-  
SPECTOR M. R. REID.

Who Must Move From Sydenham or  
Resign—The Councillors Have  
More to Say About Sydenham High  
School.

At the Frontenac county council meeting on Thursday morning, Councilor Donaldson, on behalf of the educational committee, which went to Napanee on Wednesday afternoon, to confer with the educational committee of the Lennox and Addington council, regarding the claim of school Inspector J. B. Reid, reported the following decision of the joint committees:

"We recommend no increase in the salary of Mr. Reid; also that Mr. Reid be requested to reside in the inspectorate, failing to comply with which request, we ask for his resignation."

On motion of Councillors Reid and Godkin, the above recommendation was adopted by the council.

The Ontario Exploration company applied to the county council for release of the water lot in front of the town line produced between the townships of Ernestown and Kingston, and extending out into the waters of Collins Bay, to a depth of 650 feet, and consent to the issuing of a permit therefor by the minister of lands and forests for Ontario. Both the counties of Frontenac, and Lennox and Addington are interested in the water lot. An agreement prepared for the transfer was referred to the roads committee, which will visit the syndicate's property at Collins Bay and report to the council. The Exploration syndicate has erected a pier at the bay for shipment of its ore from Wilbur mines, which were closed down lately. This is the syndicate whose dealings are before the United States federal grand jury at New York.

A report was given the council by Agent J. C. McConachie, of the Children's Aid Society, regarding the work he had done since last spring. Thirty-five cases had drifted into Kingston during the past few years, and fifty per cent were from Frontenac, and not the choicest of the county's population by any means. He had visited ten wards in the county and placed ten new ones there this year. The society had been fortunate in getting good homes for the wards. The above cases constituted 16.9 per cent of the work done by the society and cost \$170. The county "driftwood" cases cost \$125. Other expenses amounted to \$52. So that the agent thought a fair amount of good work had been done for Frontenac through Children's Aid work. So far he had made no wards out of county children. He had spent his time in trying to improve the conditions of some Frontenac children, whose family surroundings were not very good.

Mr. Alexander Reid, president of the Kingston Children's Aid Society, also spoke. The society had a first-class group, who had a deterrent effect upon people who were not bringing up their children properly. "Prof. Laird praised the Kingston newspaper for giving such full publicity to the work of the society. This public action had a most beneficial effect throughout the community. The county council was also commended by Prof. Laird for its financial aid. He was not asking for an increased grant, but simply for a renewal of the \$150 the council had granted the society off with."

In reply to Councillor Kennedy, Prof. Laird and Mr. McConachie stated that no work had been done by the local society in Lennox and Addington, because the Kingston and Frontenac district took up all the agent's time. Hence no grant was asked from the Lennox council. On account of the large government grant of \$180, the Ontario government had sent Mr. McConachie upon special missions in Eastern Ontario.

On motion of Councillors Rankin and Stewart, the council placed itself upon record as approving of an application being made to the minister of

Education to adopt the report of the building committee.

A. W. Gray, county engineer, gave a report of the work done during the past season on the roads of the county, under the good roads system.

Music was rendered by McAuley & Salisbury's orchestra and the programme of twenty numbers, with as many encores, was enjoyed to the limit. Refreshments were served, and it was about 1:30 when the affair closed with the final waltz.
