**SCOTCH CURLERS VISIT KINGSTON ON JAN. 20TH AND 21ST.**  
Canadian curlers at Oxford Have Strong Hockey Team—Fate and Harvard Rugby Teams Will Meet on Saturday.

Waterloo is the latest town to announce the death of professional hockey. An effort is being made to secure for Ottawa a franchise in the Canadian hockey league. The meeting of the World and West at Los Angeles on Nov. 20th, is the next big feature.

Princeton won the big Four championship when they defeated Yale by six to three on Yale field at New Haven. An extra of the Canada Gazette announces that after December 6th, the coal duty goes on again in the far western provinces.

No Stanley cup games will be played until the close of the season, when they may be brought to Toronto because of the artificial ice in Arena Gardens.

Edward Withers and Stanley Johnson were arrested at Ogdensburg, N.Y., on Monday, charged with the theft of forty prize chickens from the henery of Albert Haley.

Negotiations are under way for the transfer of Duffin from the Boston Bruins to the New York Giants, in exchange for Murray and a sum of money, said to be \$50,000.

The Cobalt district hockey clubs entering teams this year in the senior series are: Silver City, of Cobalt; McKinley-Darragh mines; O'Brien mine, Nipissing mines.

It would not be surprising if "Bill" Jarvis was in the game Saturday for the Toronto scullers at quarter, and O'Connell moved out to outside wing. Jarvis' shoulder is all right again.

There is only a slight difference in the uniforms of the Varsity and Arcadian teams, that being in the stockings, and it has been suggested that one of the team make a change.

The Ontario Curling Association is to entertain the Scotch tourists at Kingston, Peterboro, Hamilton, Galt, London and Detroit. The Kingston dates are Jan. 20th and 21st.

The famous "Battling" Nelson, lightweight champion of the world, will show his prowess in Toronto on Nov. 30th. "Tom" Flanagan has signed the "Battling" to fight "Joe" Sperry, of New York, on Feb. 1st.

Canadian curlers at Oxford will have a strong hockey team this season. They have already won some games, and will compete at the international tournament in Switzerland, at which they won the championship last season.

The "new" football has been mastered in the United States, and now the casualty list is so small that one needs a microscope to read it. There have only been three or four deaths this year, while there were 30 in 1909, with 236 injured, and 21 in 1910, with 491 injured.

The chief American game for Saturday will be that between Harvard and Yale, usually regarded as the principal struggle of the year. Both teams have been disappointed this season, but the national interest is as great as ever.

The interprovincial hockey union is to change its complexion again. Cliff-ides and New Edinburgh, of Ottawa, are the teams that are left, and applications for admission have been received from the Redfox and Vargreek Hill clubs, which played last winter in the Ottawa Valley League.

Ottawa College has also applied. The winners will play off with the amateur champions of Montreal to decide the championship.

**CONTINUES TO KILL GIRLS IN ATLANTA, GEORGIA.**

**He Has Murdered Thirteen So Far—The Southern City is Terrorized—The Bodies Mutilated.**

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 23.—The body of a comely mulatto girl was found about noon yesterday, in an alley leading off one of the principal streets of Atlanta. The girl's throat was cut from ear to ear, her heart had been cut out and laid by her side and her body was otherwise mutilated.

The girl was the thirteenth victim of Atlanta's "ripper," and the second one within a week. The "ripper" has been operating in Atlanta for several months. In every case he has selected a comely negro girl, usually a mulatto. All the victims have been mutilated in a similar manner. In some cases the index finger of the right hand has been removed.

So far the detectives are without any clue. Several theories are advanced, but the prevailing opinion is that the "ripper" is a fanatic of some kind or the agent of some organized society. The negroes of Atlanta are in state of terror.

GRAND OPERA HOUSE.  
McEwan's Mystic Work Viewed by a Big Audience.

The largest audience so far this week greeted the Great McEwan company at the Grand Opera House last evening. Before the opening of the performance the lady who lay in an hypnotic sleep in the window of a store on Princess street, was awakened on the stage. The programme was a novel one and was thoroughly enjoyed by those present.

A number of citizens were invited on the stage to witness the professor's efforts in removing handcuffs from his arms and limbs. They were Thomas McAuley, Ald. D. A. Givens, Ald. R. Hanley, Ald. John Carson and Capt. F. Reid. The arms were placed on the professor's arms and automatically fastened by the gentlemen, and in a few minutes were removed. One, four or five were fastened on his arms and each one was removed by the professor without any difficulty. The manacles worn by prisoners sentenced to the mines of Siberia were also removed in a few minutes.

The Judge Lynch manacles shared the same fate, and one pair specially made for him also fell to the ground. In his hypnotic work the professor gave an entirely new exhibit. The positions in which his subjects were placed were closely watched. By request, a game of baseball was witnessed by the hypnotic sleepers.
