PREFERS TO BE RIGHT

THAN PREMIER OF DOMINION OF CANADA.

Birthday Party of Sir Wilfrid Laurier—"Fight on, We are Right," is the Liberal Cry.

Ottawa, Nov. 23.—"I would rather be right than be premier," said Sir Wilfrid Laurier last night to the liberal members of parliament assembled at a banquet tendered in honor of his seventy-first birthday. That the "Old Chief," who met temporary defeat on September 21st, fighting for the principles of which liberalism is founded, and which has been right, and possesses now even a larger measure of the confidence and affection of his followers than he held before the elections, was evidenced by the remarkable ovation which he received on rising to reply to the toast in his honor. His declaration that his health was never better, that he was ready to still lead the party as long as his strength remained to him, and that he would maintain without discouragement or wavering the principles of freedom, equal rights and justice to all creeds and all classes, which he had learned from the highest traditions of English liberalism, was received with a demonstration of cheer after cheer, lasting several minutes.

His eloquent and dignified declaration, that defeat under all the conditions of a decent fight brought with it no cause for shame or despair, and that the party could continue with high hopes that the light for principles which must in the end triumph, was a battle cry from the "Old Chief," which met with an inspiring and enthusiastic response from his followers.

The most characteristic feature of the gathering, apart from the remarkable testimony it bore to the continued loyalty of liberals to their leader, was the spirit of optimism and determination to relieve the recent defeat by a united and vigorous attack on the new administration.

Hugh Guthrie, was toastmaster, and his eloquent tribute to Sir Wilfrid as the greatest and the most loyal of all Canadians, was echoed by all the other speakers.

ROWELL AT NAPANEE

SAYS SPOILS SYSTEM SHOULD BE ABOLISHED.

Civil Service Reform the New Feature in His Speech—A Big Gathering Held Here.

Napanee, Nov. 23.—In every meeting since N. W. Rowell, P.C., has addressed during the present campaign he has dealt at length with some part of his policy which he had not previously emphasized. Civil service reform was the new feature in his speech here yesterday afternoon, the most forceful he has yet made.

Mr. Rowell, as a leader, who if put into power, would conduct public affairs along clean and progressive lines. He made a strong plea for restoration of the model schools, saying he had been informed that of the 136 teachers in Lennox and Addington, 100 are teaching on permits only.

After pointing out how Sir Great Britain, India and the United States the civil service is maintained on a high level, Mr. Rowell said that the movement for civil service reform in Ontario had the support of both parties, and it was to be hoped that its operation would be specifically extended to the outside as well as to the inside service.

"In Ontario we have made no advance," said he, "the spoils and patronage systems still hold sway. Strong journalistic supporters of the present government like the Toronto News have pressed the matter upon the attention of the government, but Sir James, with that strange sympathy which he holds to his own and progressive ideas in these matters, refuses to move.

"We may admire Sir James' good qualities of mind and heart without accepting his opinions. Surely in this province of Ontario if we do not lead we should seek to follow the best examples and traditions of British public service."

INCREASE FOR TEACHERS.

Understood Board Will be Asked to Boost Salaries.

There was a meeting of the management committee of the board of education on Wednesday night, when the request of the teachers for an increase in salary was discussed, but as usual, when such important matters are taken up, the members were afterwards "mum" on the subject, there being a rule that no information shall be given out about the doings of committee until the said report is presented to the board.

Although no authoritative statement could be secured, it is pretty well understood that the committee will make a recommendation to boost the salaries of the teachers, as it is felt something must be done to keep the teachers.

ROBBERY AT ODESSA.

The Store of Mrs. N. F. Snider Was Ransacked.

Some time during Wednesday night, the general store at Odessa, which has for years been kept by Mrs. N. F. Snider, was broken into and mortgaged, notes, checks, and a small amount of cash stolen. By what could be learned Mrs. Snider's loss runs up into the thousands.

The Whig was in telephone communication with Mrs. Snider's son, and he confirmed the report. According to his story the men broke into the blacksmith shop of Eugene Smith across the road and obtained his tools with which to smash their way in. Considerable force was necessary to effect an entrance, and before they were able to get inside the midnight marauders had to break two strong locks. From marks which were left it is quite evident that there were two men. They held a candle as marks of tallo were discernible around the store. Three tills were smashed open but the robbers were rewarded with only a small amount of change.

The safe, standing at the back of the store, was also the object of attack, but when it was broken open nothing but papers could be found. Deeds and mortgages and a couple of notes which, although valueless to the thieves, were worth about \$5,000 to Mrs. Snider, were taken.

From what could be gathered the deed was committed about one o'clock in the morning but the owners of the store have not the slightest knowledge of who the guilty parties are. The police at Kingston and Napanee were notified and Chief Graham, of Napanee, was on the scene Thursday.

The papers are worth next to nothing to those now having them in their possession as they dare not present the checks or notes anywhere to be cashed. This is the second time that the store has been broken open as about six months ago an entrance was effected and about \$100 worth of jewellery taken. Apparently the thieves wanted nothing but money this time as nothing in the store was touched.

Mrs. Snider's husband died about eight years ago and since that time the store has been run by her son. The business has been established for forty-two years.
