That being so, the discussion on which they were entering was narrowled down in reality to these two conditions. On the general principle really there was nothing more to be said. The German empire to-des was absolutely based on the principle of home rule, and the British empire existed and was held local autonomy. What they had to show was that in the -pplication of that principle to Ireland the two necessary conditions to which he had referred would be fulfilled. 1rist nationalists asked the government to make it plain beyond the possibility of doubt, that those conditions would

fulfilled, and to make it plain in th terms of their proposals. Nationalists asked today for what was known as a subordinate parlia ment, as distinguished from Grattan's parliament, which was a co-ordinate and sovereign parliament just as much as the parliament of England was at the time. What we mean in popular phraseology, Mr. Redmond went on, by a subordinate parliament is this, that whatever the Irish parliament (Cheers.) If the Irish parliament attempts to outstep its powers, or to abuse its powers, or attempts to encreed, the supreme power of the im-perial parliament will remain unim-paired to curb the wrong-doing. 
