TALKED OF BRIDGE TO EXCHANGE LETTERS THE WORLD'S EPISODES

OLD QUESTION AGAIN BEFORE FINANCE COMMITTEE

New Government Will be Appealed to For Aid—Question of Architect For New Hotel Was Also Discussed.

On Friday evening the members of the finance committee, and the marine committee of the Board of Trade, had a conference in regard to steps to be taken to purchase a bridge. As usual, the finance committee held a "star chamber" session on the matter, and Saturday morning the members were "in" on the subject. What information they had on the matter, they are certainly keeping "under their hat" as the saying goes.

However, it is understood, that in the matter of the bridge, the members are very anxious to know what the new government is willing to do, and a deputaion will wait upon it at as early a date as possible. Harbor improvements are desired, but it has been pointed out that the present bridge would seriously interfere with any improvements. The Laurier government voted \$50,000 for harbor improvements, and the new government will be applied to for aid.

Another question before the meeting was that of the appointment of an architect for the new hotel. It is understood that after plans have been arranged for the new hotel, the different architects will be asked for a price on the entire work.

The school-linking branch of the League of the Empire is busy putting the children of the schools of England into communication with the children of the schools of Canada and other parts of the empire. Many of the names of Canada's villages, towns, counties and post-offices are repetitions of names of similar places in England and children of the schools of places of similar names are communicating with one another. Exchanging descriptive letters and views of the places, besides being a first-class means of encouraging good letter-writing and good composition, it serves to link the affections as well and strengthen the best ties of the empire.

Recently a request from the children of Petworth school, Sussex, England, was received, asking to be linked with their namesake, Petworth, in Frontenac, and the children of each are now preparing to exchange letters. This is going on throughout the entire British empire and has the support of the great men and women of all the countries in the empire, and is encouraged by valuable prizes for essays. This year a girl, aged fourteen, living on the island of Singapore, at the extreme south of the Malay peninsula, wrote the essay that won the Lord North Empire Day Challenge cup, and League of the Empire prize.
