Defeated Argonauts by 14 to 7.
Running-Passing Game Superior to the Old Style of Straight Football.

For the third year in succession, Varsity wins the Dominion rugby championship. In Toronto on Saturday afternoon, it defeated Argonauts by 14 to 7 in the final game. Throughout the collegians showed better form. It was their passing that won the game. It was a case of the running-passing game as against what is known as straight football. If the inter-provincial teams are to compete with the inter-collegiate, they will have to adopt the open style of play, for it is this system that has given Varsity the championship these three years. The universities have an advantage over city teams, an advantage which is increasing every year, and the time may yet come when rugby will be confined to the seats of learning, as it is in the United States.
