STEAMER STRUCK BANK

THE REINDER OF NAPANEE RAN ON MUD BANK.

Passengers Were Taken Off in Small Boats—Steamer Sharples Sold to Reid and Baker of Detroit—Marine Notes.

The steamer Reinder, of Napanee, a small passenger boat which passed around the Bay of Quinte, making its headquarters at Napanee, had an accident in the river near Napanee, which has disabled it probably for good. The vessel has been in a bad state of repair for some time and while loaded with passengers bound for Napanee ran on a mud bank and tore a large hole in her bottom. The passengers had to be taken off in boats, and the vessel was abandoned.

Steamer Sharples Sold.

The steamer John Sharples, which was wrecked last spring, at Gallop Island, has been sold to the Reid and Baker Wrecking company, of Detroit. This vessel after experiencing one of the biggest seas that the veteran Captain Chauncey Daryew has been up against in his experience, and he has been in quite a few of them.

The schooner had a fair wind; however, and made the trip in good time. The Ford River left Charlotte on Sunday morning, at nine o'clock, and was in port at five o'clock Sunday afternoon. Just at the time the Ford River was leaving Charlotte, the weather was so rough that the car ferry, which was about to put out, had to go back to her dock.

The schooner Bertie Calkins, which

arrived at Charlotte, with fielding will be delayed there a few days, owing to the fact that the boat was unloading the vessel, suffered a break down. The vessel will thus have to be unloaded with horses.

The steamer Dundee, passed up on Sunday.

ACTING AS ADVISER

PROSPECTS FOR HAM IN MEXICO ARE BRIGHT.

No One is Allowed to See the Prisoner, Who is in One of the Notorious Mexican Institutions—Mr. Ham Keeps Up.

W. S. Herrington, of the law firm of Herrington & Warner, Napanee, who has been in Mexico for the past six weeks, in the interests of George I. Ham, the Napanee man who is in prison in Mexico, alleged to have defrauded the Bank of Montreal, writes to friends in Napanee, to say that prospects look bright for Ham to get free and also to win his case. Mr. Herrington is not allowed to plead for Ham as that is contrary to the rules of the country. But he supports and advises the counsel there.

The prison in which he is confined is one of the most notorious in Mexico and one who is confined there for any length of time is lucky if he ever sees the light of day again as most of those who go in there never come out. No one is allowed to see him and his meals are passed in through a small hole in the wall barely large enough to put one's hand through. This is all the light he gets, too. How any one can live in a dungeon like this is surprising but Mr. Ham seems to have kept up so far. Several Napanee witnesses are down there.

How Long Will He Be Confined in Penitentiary?

Now that the directors of the defunct Farmers' bank have been acquitted, the question arises as to how long W. R. Travers, the former manager, will be confined within prison walls. He was brought down to the penitentiary from Toronto, Friday.

While in Toronto, Travers was a prisoner of the detective department, the sheriff having been relieved of the responsibility of his safe keeping. He was confined to the jail, over the Don, and was treated as a prisoner on remand. His sentence is for six years.

LECTURE GIVEN ON CHINA

By Rev. Dr. Donald Macgillivray at Queen's.
