## SAVING THE WORLD A Reasonable Plea For the Stomach

THE OBLIGATIONS RESTING UPON CHRIST'S FOLLOWERS.  
A Menace to Canada is the Foreign Immigration Unless the Peoples Are Brought Under Christian Civilization.

"Is Christianity Essential to Civilization?" was the question Rev. F. E. Shore, general secretary of the foreign branch of the Methodist mission work, put to the congregation of Queen Street Methodist church, on Sunday morning, and in an address of strength and force, he demonstrated that it was essential, that without it the Anglo-Saxon race would be as superstitious, as ignorant, as debased as were those in lands where religions were taught but which lacked moral fibre and uplifting vital force.

Rev. Mr. Shore is a man of impressive manner, with good voice and ready tongue. He spoke with authority of his recent year's trip around the world to study the civilization and conditions of other peoples, giving him an insight into the baleful state of those to whom the gospel message had never come. He spoke of Mohammedanism, Buddhism, and Confucianism, and pointed out wherein they failed to uplift, to educate, or to improve the world. He spoke of the obligations resting upon Christians especially in keeping high ideals and Christian aims in moulding and assimilating the thousands of foreigners coming to our shores. Unless christianized they would be a menace to Canada in later times.

**Princess Street Church.**  
"The church is allowed to die because at times I believe there are too many other societies in the church for its good," declared Irvin Hilliard, a prominent barrister of Morrisburg, in Princess Street Methodist Church, on Sunday morning. Mr. Hilliard is one of the most prominent laymen of the Montreal conference, and travels all over the province, speaking in different churches.

His subject Sunday morning, was "The Redemption of the World." Speaking on behalf of Missions and urging for their support, Mr. Hilliard said that often when a person was approached to contribute something for the support of missions, the excuse would often be given that he belonged to the Epworth League, or to the Young Men's club, or to the Sunday school, or some other organization. The speaker said he believed that these societies were doing good work by themselves, but that there were so many of them in the church today that the church itself was allowed to suffer.

Another noticeable thing that he considered was a detriment to the church today, was the fact that with most ministers they did not seem to care whether a man was a Christian or not, so long as he attended the sanctuary regularly, and contributed his share to the funds. His address was powerful and fascinating, and listened to by a large congregation. Rev. C. E. Manning, of Toronto, spoke in the evening.

**Sydenham Street Church.**  
Rev. C. E. Manning, general secretary for home missions of the Canadian Methodist church, and a former pastor of Sydenham street church, occupied the pulpit in that church, Sunday morning. This is Mr. Manning's first visit to Kingston since he left, six years ago.

From the text, "He shall have dominion also from sea to sea, and from the river unto the ends of the earth," (Psalm lxxviii, 8), Mr. Manning gave a very enlightening discourse on home mission problems, we are called to face to-day.

The preacher dwelt on the essentials necessary for true greatness of any nation. To aspire to material greatness, a nation must be rich in material things and have a large population. The former we are greatly blessed with, and as to the latter, following up the stream of immigration we are receiving, in the not too distant future, Mr. Manning asserted, one million souls will come to our shores every year. Unless Canada is inhabited by a God-fearing Christian people, who stand for the things that are highest and best, and against all forms of evil we shall never be a great nation. The preacher said that home mission work was a great factor in the making of a nation. Overlapping is one of the difficulties, but the different denominations are adjusting things so as to overcome this. The Italians are left largely to the

## ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH

LARGE CONGREGATIONS HEARD  
REV. S. J. COMPTON.  
Delivered Timely Address to Children at Morning Service in Addition to His Sermon—Two Able Discourses Given.

Two very large congregations gathered at St. Andrew's church, on Sunday, to hear Rev. S. J. Compton, B.D., of Belfast, Ireland. The reverend gentleman presented two thoughtful and forceful discourses, and was listened to with great interest. The choir ably assisted in the services of the day.

At the morning service, Mr. Compton delivered a short and very timely address to the children, before the regular sermon. He spoke on "Disobedience and Selfishness," taking as his text, Paul's words to the Philippians, "Beware of idols," and gave the children many useful lessons. He pointed out how the little children were apt to grow up disobedient and selfish, and pointed out how they could keep on the right path all through life, by keeping right with Jesus Christ. They would have their parents, teachers, or pastors to help them for a time, but there came a time in each one of their lives, when all these friends would pass away, and then they would have to face life's battles alone. It was then that they would need the courage to stand alone with Christ as their friend.

For his sermon, Mr. Compton chose the text, Philippians iii, 13: "Brethren, I count not myself to have apprehended; but this one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before."

The speaker referred to Paul and his life, which he used as an example to make one of more devotion. He felt that he needed some controlling power. He knew that there must be one objective point, and he pointed his life on this. Some people had a great many interests, in the world, but no supreme interest. One could see this in our every day life. Paul's earnestness was a great thing, but it was not all easy for him. Paul's aim was a definite one, and it was also important. It was to glorify God.

Rev. Mr. Compton in the evening spoke to a very large congregation from the words, "What think ye of Christ?" in a thoughtful way he discussed the attitude of men in answering the question and closed with a personal appeal. Every man must answer the question himself. The risen Christ was ready and willing to reform the most debased and restore him to favor and position.

Mr. Compton, aged thirty-two, is a capable speaker, pleasing in style and earnest and effective in manner. He is thoroughly evangelical and his discourses showed wide sympathy, intense interest and whole-hearted passion for the well-being of men. His addresses were heard with pleasure by the congregation of St. Andrew's and many others.

After a very short illness the death of Mrs. Henry Mullin, formerly of Prescott, took place at the City Hospital, Ogdenburg, N.Y., on November 16th, at the advanced age of seventy-six years. The remains were interred at Prescott.

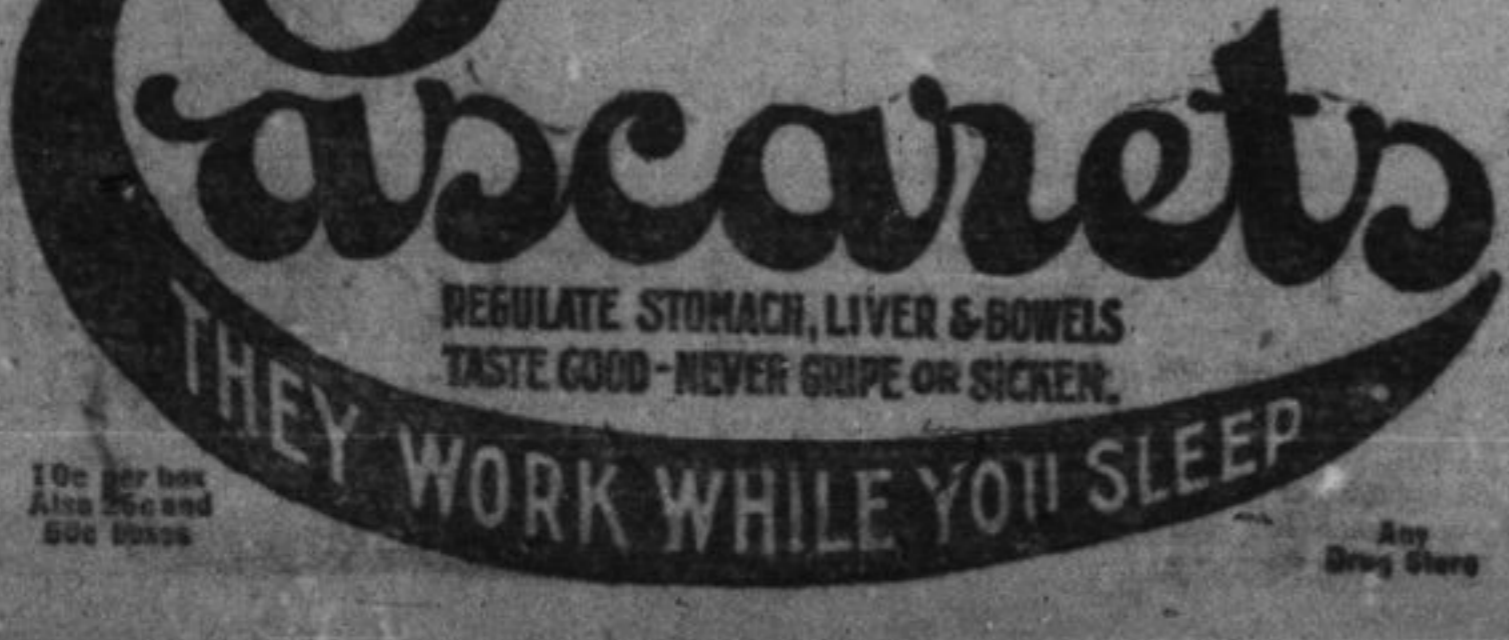
