

Considering a Plan.

Ottawa, Nov. 25.—The Royal Military College regulations may be  
largely followed in a Halifax institu-

tion. Whatever policy may be  
adopted by the Borden ministry with  
respect to naval assistance to the  
empire, it is said to be quite possible  
that the naval college at Halifax  
will be maintained and the training  
ships utilized for turning out cadets.

The situation is that Canada  
has now on its hands these two  
vessels, intended for training purposes  
only, and while it has been clearly  
set forth that the new government  
does not intend to go ahead with  
the latest minister's naval proposals,  
the college may be of utility in training  
men either for service in the  
imperial navy or for whatever form  
of naval assistance may be subsequently  
decided upon. The argument is  
being put forth that an institution  
of that sort may perform a  
function somewhat similar to that  
of the Royal Military College at  
Kingston. The matter at least  
is being considered.

Dr. Arthur McDevitt, charged with

alty is a year in jail.
