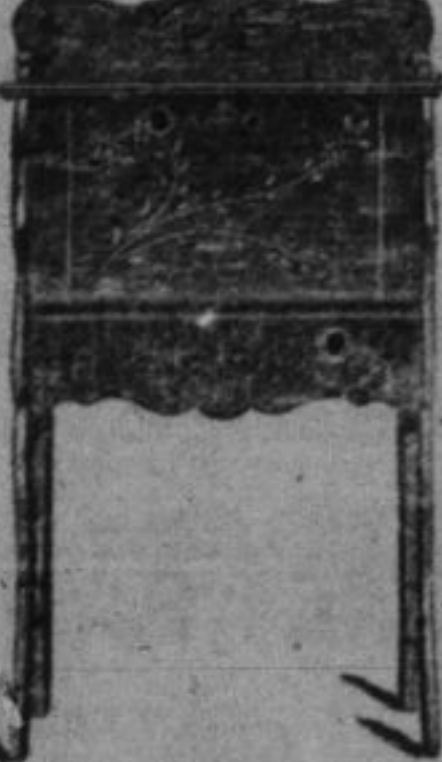

Intrinsic Value of Man

The intrinsic value of a man or woman weighing 150 pounds, according to his or her constituent elements, is \$7,500. This is the conclusion of a German scientific writer as published in Berlin. A LECTURE AT QUEEN'S

ON "CHINA ASLEEP" BY DR. DONALD MACGILLIVRAY.

How the West Views the East—On Closer Inspection We Find Just a Long-lost Brother.

Rev. Dr. Donald Macgillivray, of Shanghai, China, gave an address in convocation hall, on Monday evening. His subject was, "China Asleep." The speaker said the title was a misnomer. China had certainly been closer to the rest of the world, but within her own borders she had been developing a civilization as distinctive in type as the marshals of Australia are in the animal kingdom. The Chinese have a literature which is classical in every sense of the word. It is governed by strict metrical rules. It is so difficult to learn that no foreigner has ever yet been able to produce a book in this language that would stand the test of critical examination. The spoken language is easily acquired, but to spread western literature it is still necessary for the foreigner to employ native Chinese to do the writing. In art-pottery and embroidery the speaker showed that China was ahead of all other nations. She had a printing press four hundred years before the Gutenberg press was invented in Europe. Viewing the coming relations of China with the outside world, it was pointed out that certain traits of character developed by the law of natural selection would tend to make the Chinese a formidable business man. The tremendous effort necessary to prepare for their examination system has produced a race of scholars that for attention to minutiae put to blush the Germans with their attention to the Greek particles, or the Hebraist with his scheme of inflections. Long years of suffering at the hands of inexperienced physicians and surgeons has produced a people that are practically without nerves. What will be the result, in business, when that "western bundle of nerves" the business man comes into commercial contact with these people? It was shown that so far as belief in the ancient religions was concerned the Chinese were practically atheistic, owing largely to the happenings of the past score of years. Now is the time to get in the good work if ever it is to be done. The speaker referred to a fable of the Chinese, "In the distance a form appears, the man is afraid, he thinks it is a tiger. It draws nearer. He sees it is a tiger. It comes still closer and he recognizes a long lost brother." So the west views the east. At a distance we fear it as a tiger, but on closer inspection we trust we shall find a "long lost brother."

MAKES FINE HOSTESS

LADY KIRKPATRICK IN SOCIETY IN LONDON.

She is Ready to Help in Any Cause in Which Canada is Interested—Souvenirs in Her Charming Apartments.

From an English Exchange. An Anglo-Canadian hostess whose knowledge of social and official life in her native land dates from her childhood is Lady Kirkpatrick, widow of the late Sir George A. Kirkpatrick, formerly lieutenant-governor of Ontario, and one of the best known and most highly respected of the public men of the dominion. Lady Kirkpatrick was Miss Mabel Macpherson, a daughter of the late Sir David Macpherson, formerly speaker of the Canadian senate, and foremost among Canadian politicians and men of affairs. Her mother was a Miss Nelson, a member of a Canadian family conspicuous in the life of the country for several generations. Her brother, William Nelson Macpherson, of Quebec, is well known in London as well as in Canada. Lady Kirkpatrick's experience of London society began when as a young girl she used to cross the Atlantic on visits, and she had many friends in London and other parts of England, besides the numerous Canadians either living in London by business or visiting to the mother country. Her beautiful flat in Hyde Park Gate is a popular centre of Canadian and English guests, who are afforded an opportunity of meeting and discussing the affairs of both countries in congenial surroundings. Lady Kirkpatrick, besides entertaining extensively, is ready to help in any cause with which Canada is connected, directly or indirectly. Last summer, when the question of the part Canada should play in the Pageant of Empire was much to the fore, Lady Kirkpatrick gave a large reception to Canadian visitors, when the subject was fully explained and discussed, and as a result many names were obtained of those willing to help in the Canadian cause.

It is about three years since Lady Kirkpatrick established herself in London, and quickly became identified with Anglo-Canadian society. In her charming apartment she has many souvenirs of her Canadian life, as the daughter and the wife of men in public positions. At the time she married Sir George Kirkpatrick he was speaker of the House of Commons, and the marriage of the speaker of the senate while both held office is supposed to be unique in Canadian annals. Lady Kirkpatrick owns the great chair her husband occupied as speaker, the chair of her father being in the possession of her brother. There are other no less of her life as the wife of the lieutenant-governor of Ontario, when Lady Kirkpatrick was the official leader of society in Toronto and a popular and agreeable hostess. Among them are two magnificent silver bowls presented to Sir George and Lady Kirkpatrick on the expiration of the former's term of office. Major-General Kirkpatrick, R.E., C.B., Lady Kirkpatrick's step-son, is at present commander of the military forces in Australia. Her only child, Capt. Eric Kirkpatrick, is in the King's Own Light Infantry, at present stationed in Hong Kong. Miss Helen Kirkpatrick, her step-daughter, lives in England, where she has many friends.
