## NATIONALISTS BLAMED FOR THE AGITATION AGAINST BI-LINGUAL SCHOOLS.

Le Canada Says Their Intemperance is Responsible—Le Temps Says it is a Question of Constitutional Right.

"Le Canada" of Montreal, in a double column front page editorial on the Ontario bi-lingual school question in Ontario, says it seems that these schools are in danger of being abolished, and seeks to find a reason for the sudden expression of hostility on the part of large sections of the English-speaking population. "Le Canada" gives as the reason:

"It is the intemperance of the demands of men like Bourassa and Lavergne in claiming an absolute right, as a right supported by the constitution, the right of our compatriots living in other provinces to teach their children French in the public schools."

"As long as the French-Canadians were satisfied to address themselves to their English countrymen's sense of justice, to ask from them 'fair play,' and to make an appeal for mutual tolerance and conciliation, they obtained, though not at the very first attempt, all that they asked for, important concessions, in which, however, were concealed some political aims, but which gave our fellow-countrymen a gradual amelioration of their situation, and made them hope, by degrees, to finally arrive at their goal. But the intemperance of the nationalists, their haughty demands, their affirmations of rights that the text of the constitution did not clearly establish, have drawn forth reprisals on the part of our English-speaking countrymen."

"And in the face of these demands they have made theirs, which we write down here without wishing to estimate their value, but asking only that our readers place themselves in their position, and judge them impartially."

"We wish, they say, that all the children of our province learn the language of the province, which is the English language, but in the bi-lingual schools, whether from lack of time or incompetency in instructors, they do not learn it."

"It is not by means of comminatory declarations—we are convinced—that one can make them hope to abandon this position."

"How does it happen, we also ask ourselves, that the redoubtable champion of the French language, who makes for themselves at home a very glory out of this championship (of French), have not already gone to the aid of their fellow-countrymen whom their demands, at the very least imprudent, have placed in danger?"

"How is it then that Messrs. Bourassa and Lavergne have not thrown themselves into this conflict, and have not attempted to obtain from the English-speaking population of the province of Ontario, at least the maintenance of concessions previously obtained?"

"Is it then that they dare not go and convince, persuade, convert among them the adversaries of bi-lingual schools?"

"Mr. Bourassa was not afraid to go and speak in the county of Nipissing, in order to have elected an adversary of Sir Wilfrid Laurier; Mr. Lavergne was not afraid to hold a meeting at the university of Toronto; why do they then not go and preach the rights of the French in Toronto, Hamilton, London, everywhere where the bi-lingual schools are attacked?"

"Le Temps," of Ottawa, in an editorial, concludes as follows:

"This is a fact that the enemies of the French language ought not to lose sight of, namely, that in Ontario, as in all other parts of Canada, the existence of French is a historic fact it is not in any person's power to suppress; that in the province of Ontario as in the other provinces of the confederation, French is spoken, written, printed and propagated for the simple reason that it is Frenchmen who have penetrated into, evangelized and conquered for the Christian civilization, that immense territory which extends from Ottawa to the Detroit river and thence to the great Lake Superior far up into the regions of the north."

"The duality of language in Ontario is, then, an altogether natural thing; it is a part of the social, political and religious order, which is increased into history, and which all, in spite of themselves, must acknowledge. The French-Canadian nationality has passed through terrible storms, resisted rude attacks, and triumphed over terrible ordeals. She has gained, by her battles, liberty and peace. She asks to-day in Ontario only what she has haughtily won, and what she granted to the hemmed-in minorities of the province of Quebec—liberty and peace."

"Yet our enemies declare themselves against it, yet the French language will continue to be spoken and taught in spite of the outcries of fanatics from Toronto and elsewhere, and in spite of the anti-bilingual candidates which already appear in some fanatical centres of our province. Let it be remembered, the teaching of French is not a question of privilege, but a question of law and constitutional right."

**Going Home For Christmas.**  
Winnipeg, Nov. 28.—The east-bound train of the C. P. R. last night went in two sections, the first bearing about three hundred passengers, second class, and the second with about two hundred, first-class, all bound for Europe, for the Christmas holidays. The greater number will go to their homes in Germany, Austria and Russia.

## ATTENTION IS CALLED TO PERNICIOUS PLAYS COMING TO CANADA.

Enough Not Being Done to Keep Them Out—Vulgar Jokes Too Common in Plays.

Halifax, N.S., Nov. 25.—(To the Editor): I would like to call attention to the numbers of pernicious plays and common cheap vaudeville performances which are coming to Canada; the latter are holding forth in the cheap theatres such as the nickels, largely patronized by women and children. I do not think there is enough being done in the direction of keeping them out of Canada. The class of material which they are giving in the way of amusement is mostly made up of vulgar and suggestive jokes and acts. This form of low sentiment is fast permeating the youths throughout Canada.

There is another feature which is fully as bad as that of vulgarity—it is the way they bring in and make light of religious subjects in their jokes, also their jests at matrimony and domestic affairs, which can but go far to destroy the sanctity of the home. This I believe is doing as much harm as downright vulgarity.

You can hear numbers of jokes on lines such as, "The husband leaves his home in the morning by the front door, the wife admits a lover by the back door." Scenes depicting immorality in the home, drunken scenes where the husband comes home in the morning with "a jag on." Such examples as this can be depreciate the home and poison the minds of the young. In the United States, for years one of the leading jokes in this line was directed at the mother-in-law. This was carried so far that in many states a law was passed to stop its further use, but still you can hear it used in the United States and through Canada by these cheap actors.

These classes of performances should be kept out of Canada; but they certainly can be found in most all cities and towns of any importance. There has been a law passed in Ontario to prevent the exhibiting of demoralizing pictures in the nickel shows. But I do not think any consideration has been given to these low vaudeville actors. If the law covers them then such a law should exist that would keep them out of all parts of Canada.

I saw recently that efforts were being made in some places to prevent these cheap vaudeville performances from appearing in the nickel shows. If such a law were passed and enforced in the province of Ontario, it would be the means of keeping them out of Canada. Most of these performers come direct from the lowest dives in the United States, and are a class that should not be permitted to take part in the providing of amusement for our people in Canada.—GEORGE WRIGHT.

## PREMIER ROBLIN SATISFIED.

Provincial Government Got All it Wanted at Ottawa.

Winnipeg, Nov. 28.—Premier Roblin has returned from the east, where he has conferred with Premier Borden regarding the extension of the Manitoba boundary. He said that the provincial government had got all they wanted—the placing of Manitoba on a basis of absolute equality with the sister provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta. The question of natural resources, he said, would come up later on, it being Premier Borden's policy that when other two provinces are being given consideration on their applications for their natural resources, Manitoba shall be considered on exactly the same footing. That was certainly as much as his government could expect, added the premier. He had nothing to say on the report from Toronto that Ontario was to get access to a port on Hudson Bay through a friendly arrangement with Mackinac.

## NEW TRIAL FOR SLAYER.

Harry Wilson Had Been Sentenced to be Hanged.

Halifax, N.S., Nov. 26.—Late last summer, Harry Wilson, of Digby, was tried by Judge Meagher, and a jury on a charge of the murder of his brother. He was convicted and sentenced to be hanged on November 15th. It came out in the evidence that Wilson was intoxicated when he committed the deed, and it was agreed that, therefore, he did not know what he was doing. The judge did not direct the jury on manslaughter, confining himself on the charge of murder, but he granted a crown case reserved and afterwards the court postponed the date of execution for one month to give time for agreement. The full bench yesterday gave judgment unanimously ordering a new trial on the ground that the charge to the jury by Judge Meagher was erroneous because of failure to direct the jury on the subject of manslaughter and to submit any questions.

## WRECK OF THE MAINE.

Ship Destroyed From Underneath. Thinks Inspectors.

Havana, Nov. 28.—The Maine inspection board will start for home some day this week. It has already been simply demonstrated to them that the Maine was destroyed by an explosion which occurred under the keel, a little to the port of the keel, between twenty-eight and thirty, where the outside skin was blown up and doubled over towards the starboard by the first explosion. After this the traverse armor bulkhead was blown off from frame twenty-four by a second explosion, and buried itself in the mud through the hole left by the first explosion, which removed that part of the bottom of the vessel.

## Adopting a Liberal Scheme.

Toronto Telegram (conservative). The Ottawa government will create a department of external affairs. The suggestion of such a move by the Laurier government was denounced on the ground that it was not consistent with Canada's colonial status. The government will do other things that would have been disapproved if Laurier had done them.
