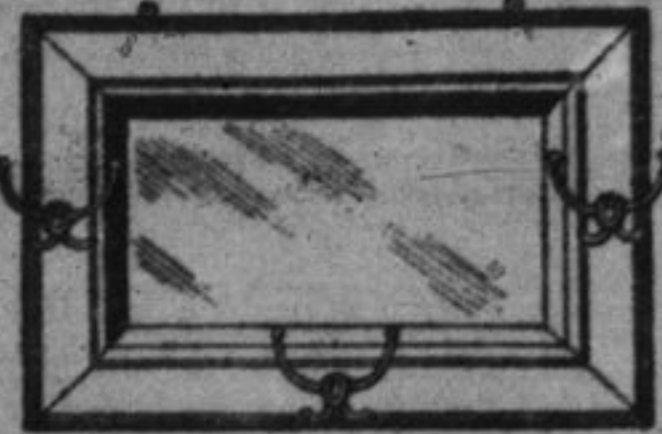
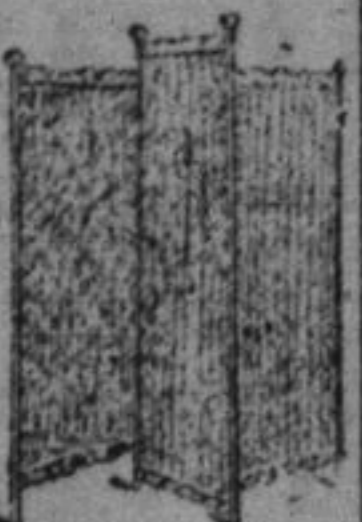

A delightfully surprised audience was that which witnessed the production of "The Lost Paradise," by the members of the Queen's Dramatic Club at the Grand, Tuesday evening. And Make Inspection of Grounds and College Buildings—Will Spend Time of Brief Stay at College. It will be an unofficial visit that their Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of Connaught, will pay to Kingston, on Saturday, but in the short time they will remain in the city, three hours, they will have much to occupy their attention. Their highnesses are coming to the city for the purpose of visiting the Royal Military College. Later on, it is their intention to pay the city a visit, and on that occasion they will be tendered a civic reception. The special train will arrive at the Kingston and Pembroke railway station, at 7.45 o'clock, on Saturday morning, the party coming from Hamilton on the Canadian Pacific railway. The train will be composed of six coaches. The programme outlined is that their highnesses will make a thorough inspection of the Royal Military College building and the grounds, and they will also see the cadets at their work. This will occupy all their time here, and they leave again at eleven o'clock for Ottawa. Col. Crowe and his party will meet their highnesses at the station. Upon their arrival the royal standard will be raised at the station, and also upon their arrival at the Royal Military College. The station will be decorated for the occasion, the superintendent, F.
