One of the smallest of the German principalities is undertaking a very big experiment in financial legislation. The diet of the elder of the two principalities of Reuss, which lies in Central Germany, to the south-east of the Thuringian states, carried yesterday, a resolution in favor of increasing the state income tax by five per cent. of the tax on incomes below £150 and £300, and by ten per cent. of the tax on incomes exceeding £300 a year in the case of unmarried persons of either sex who have reached their thirtieth year.

The diet consisted of twelve members, and the resolution was carried by a vote of eight to five. The super-taxation of bachelors has often been proposed in other German states, and was recently referred to as a possible form of imperial taxation by the Emperor William. (Litho Letter to London Times.)

Post-Mortem Surprise. Senator Sutherland, of Utah, said at a luncheon in Washington of a bill that had been defeated. "It deserved defeat, for it was full of graft. The defrauds, in their disapproval over it, reminded me of the heirs of old George Smith. 'Old George Smith was a millionaire, and his nephews and nieces had done very little hunting since their childhood, because they expected to inherit all his money. 'Well, old Smith died in due course, and a short time after his death I met one of his nephews. 'So your uncle is no more, I said. 'The nephew answered with a bitter sneer: 'A golden-haired young widow of whose existence we had never dreamed.'"

The Queer Argan Tree. Among the most remarkable trees of the world is the argan, which abounds in the southern Morocco, but is seldom seen elsewhere. A forest of argans has a curiously scattered appearance, because the trees grow singly and far apart. They are very leafy, but seldom exceed twenty feet in height. The branches put out horizontally, and a yard above the ground. Sheep, cattle and camels feed on the leaves, and goats will stand on their hind legs to reach them. The wood is very hard, and extremely useful to the natives, who make charcoal from it. The fruit, resembling a large olive, is used to feed cattle and to manufacture a valuable oil. It also furnishes the principal sustenance of many of the poorer natives.—Scientific American.

The Ivory Supply. In view of the rapid disappearance of the herds of elephants which formerly roamed in Africa, and the limited number of those animals remaining in Asia, attention has been called to the enormous supply of ivory which exists in the frozen tundras of Siberia, and which, it is thought, will probably suffice for the world's consumption for many years to come. This ivory consists of the tusks of the extinct species of elephant called mammoths. The tusks of these animals were of great size, and are wonderfully abundant at some places in Siberia, where the frost has perfectly preserved them, and in many cases has preserved the flesh of the animals also.—Scientific American.

Angling in the Air. Judge Stevens was angling in the Manitowish waters, and just as dinner became involved in an argument with his boat companion. The debate lasted some minutes, and during that time the judge had his baited hook dangling in the air over his shoulder. The guide took a hand. SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 40 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price, \$2.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to farm homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$1.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$100.00. W. W. CORY, Deputy of the Minister of the Interior.
