### SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE HEAD of a family or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter section of land in the Dominion of Canada, Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or its Agents for a certificate which may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intended homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land for each of the first two years; thereafter, six months within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of a, least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intended homesteader.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section of land for himself for \$1.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside on the homestead or pre-empt six months in each of six years from date of entry, and cultivate (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$1.00 per acre, and cultivate and retain six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

### HIS GRACE PREACHED

IN ST. MARY'S CATHEDRAL ON SUNDAY MORNING.

He Picture the Judgment Day—Archbishop Spratt Expressed His Delight at Being With St. Mary's People.

There was an unusually large congregation present in St. Mary's cathedral at high mass on Sunday. His grace, Archbishop Spratt, presided on the throne, and the Rev. Fr. Mea celebrated the mass. The archbishop occupied the pulpit, and said he was delighted to be with St. Mary's congregation. The long service on Thursday and fatigue presented him from addressing them on that occasion, but it was gratifying to him to speak to them now. He then read the epistle and gospel for the first Sunday in Advent. (Luke XXI, 25-33). The subject of his text was Ecclesiastes VII, 14.

His grace dwelt on the punishment God had inflicted upon a fallen race. Without the fear of God there would be little hope of salvation. Sin would bring upon men the fear of God's wrath. That fear would prevent them from committing sin. The fear of the Lord was the beginning of wisdom. We should let the Holy Spirit gain an absolute control of us. There was no emotion in nature like this power of fear, as it would lead them up to God. God had left nothing undone to secure for us the power of salvation. God's mercy had gone to the outside limits for us and stirred in our hearts an emotion of holy fear. The gospel to-day, said his grace, speaks of the destruction of the world, and in it our Lord gives a vivid description of this last day. There shall be signs in the sun, and in the moon, and in the stars, and upon earth distress of nations, men wailing away, for fear and expectation of what shall come upon them. Imagine a man wailing away with fear, standing before God. Imagine a man's emotion after passing through an earthquake. The scene in his mind would cause a chill of fear and terror.

St. John's vision, which he had on the Isle of Patmos, gives a vivid description of these last days. The terror of the scene was hard to imagine, men praying that the mountains would fall upon them to hide them from the wrath of God. The soul of the sinner would be united with the body, and have to stand before the judgment of God and the scorn of the world. "Depart from Me, into everlasting fire."

Even small sins that have been hidden from our minds—refusing to help the poor, feed the hungry, and give drink to the thirsty, and comfort the weak, will be counted against ourselves. Our Lord said: "As often as
