Merchants have complained that the "rush" held by the students every year, is a great nuisance, and in addition, a great drawback to business, and this year, Mayor Graham asked the students to be good, and not create any disturbance. They promised his worship that they would be good, and they also carried out their promise.

Early in the evening, Mayor Graham went over to Queen's University, and had an interview with Principal Gordon, and with the latter, asked the students to "cut out" everything that would tend to create a disturbance.

It was pointed out that no objection would be taken to the boys having all the fun they desired, in the way of giving college yells, singing songs, etc., but strong objection would be taken to the students putting on some of their "old time stunts," and clashing with the police.

Mayor Graham put the case very nicely to the boys, but at the same time he made it understood that he would not stand for any rough play, and he also gave the police the tip that they would have to "keep the boys in check, if they should go beyond the limit."

Two or three bluecoats were put on each of the five-cent theatres, in case there should be a rush, but there was no trouble whatever. Students gathered around the theatres, but they made no trouble. A large crowd of citizens walked Princess street, expecting that there would be "something doing," but they guessed wrong.

THROWN INTO HARBOR CHRIST'S WORDS AIMED

A DRUNKEN FARMER HAD A NARROW ESCAPE.

At THE WELL-TO-DO AND CHURCH ATTENDERS.

And Not so Much at the Outcasts—Dr. Paterson Smyth, of Montreal, Preached Powerful Sermon, in St. Paul's Church.

The preacher at the celebration of the holy communion in St. Paul's church, Sunday morning, was Canon Paterson Smyth, L.L.D., of St. George's church, Montreal. From the parable of the supper in Luke xiv he preached an impressive sermon. He asked how many people to-day are not in the same position as the invited guests to the supper, who made all kinds of excuses for not attending. At the time of this parable Christ was dining in the house of a wealthy Pharisee, and his conversation was not altogether agreeable to those who were listening to Him, and did not put them at their ease. But whatever was said to Christ in Grace, and courtesy to the company. He wanted to teach them that in spite of being descendants of Godly ancestors, and in spite of their being the chosen people of God, they were tied up in money-making and pleasure-seeking, and their religion was not a vital factor of their lives.

Dr. Smyth went on to say that Christ's words at that time were aimed, not only at the Jews of that day, but at the people of to-day, who felt safe enough of getting into a heaven, not as the beggars, outcasts, and the like, who perhaps have their doubts, but as the church attenders, who boast of his church and her great heritage, and have no personal realization of her great Founder. The preacher asked the question: "Does that not concern any of you?"

COLD, SNAPPY WEATHER.

The Mercury Approaches the Zero Mark Monday Morning.

The weather on Sunday and Monday was the severest that the city has experienced so far this season. On Sunday the water below the bridge was frozen sufficient for people to skate on. Smyth delivered a forceful sermon to a large audience which gathered at Grant Hall to hear him speak on Sunday afternoon. He said the subject was one which should concern young college students a great deal, as they were on the verge of a great career. He believed there was no audience which he felt more responsible in addressing, than one of young people, when he remembered the great possibilities which were before them, and what the years would bring to them.

The intention of the class is to put aside the money that each man receives from the government for his drilling, for the benefit of a new building in time to come. The will amount to quite a sum.
