

TABLET TO BE ERECTED IN HONOR OF TECUMSEH.

Granite Boulder Will Mark the Battlefield of the Thames-Work of the Village of Thamesville-

Ontario free also a past. Of course, when one comes to think of it, a babe an hour old has a past-in bud. So, too, the Canada West of half a century ago-the Canada West that was soon to be Ontario-had a past, though it was seldom thought of and was not her strong point. She was the land of hope for the dweller in older lands where social conditions far brought from out the storied past were used within the present to keep the lower classes in "that state to which Providence had called them." She was the land where the Irish ceased from troubling and got on just like the rest. like the rest.

But now she has consciously and proudly, a past. Indeed, yes! Why, it is almost twenty years since she celebrated the centennial of the beginnings of her first Legislature. And she is caring for that past and putting up memorials to show her children when their feet are on historical

The latest of these to be erected is a granite boulder which marks the battlefield of the Thames. It is on Mr. John McDowell's farm in the Township of Zone, and, he believes, about the centre of the battlefield. It was erected by the citizens of the near-by village of Thamesville, two miles distant, and was in place for the 98th anniversary of the battle-October 5. It stands three feet high and is of Victoria grey granite, the

"Here on October 5th, 1813, was fought the battle of the Thames, and here Tecumseh fell." It is intended to surround it with a substantial fence of cement blocks and otherwise to improve the spot. The "actual site" of the battle being thus appropriately marked, it is expected that the monument to Tecumseh which ought to be erected for the centennial of the battle will stand in the town park of Thamesville.

Opposite the boulder stands a fine elm, which, if it could but speak

elm, which, if it could but speak, could supply many forgotten details of the battle; and perhaps it can speak could we but hear. Eastward at the bend of the road is the spot where Proctor's solitary cannon stood -a very pretty ornament, no doubt, but, as all the ammunition except what the men carried had been captured by the Americans the day before, not very useful. At this point, in a hastily-dug pit, the bodies of the dead were burried. As lately as thirty years ago skeletons were secured here, sometimes by searchers for historical relics, sometimes by medical students. To the south, or riverward, behind their hastily-constructed abattis, stood the Indian allies, led by their great chief. And he had bound a snow-white

plume upon his gallant crest."
In a few brief minutes all was over and Proctor galloping eastward. Te-cumseh, ere he fell, must have enjoyed one moment of bitter satisfaction in seeing his opinion of the "fat squaw" justified:

Canadian Lumber.

'Advance official statistics for 1910 place the Canadian yield of lumber at 4,900,000,000 board feet, worth over \$75,000,000. Of the 26 native species of wood cut, the first nine were softwoods, spruce being the most import-ant, as it furnished one-fourth of the total cut. Spruce and white pine to-gether formed barely one-half of the 1910 cut, while in the year previous these two species made up nearly three-fifths of the total. This decrease in proportion is due not to a smaller cut of the two species, but to a great increase in the amount of Douglas fir, hemlock, cedar, and yellow pine produced in British Columbia. Onefourth of the 1909 cut was formed of these four species, while in 1910 the total cut of the four was increased 70 per cent. Up to three years ago white pine stood at the top of the list, when it was supplanted by spruce, although the actual cut of the former had not decreased. The prediction of last year that white pine had nearly reached its maximum yield has proved true, as the cut shows a falling off of 4 per cent., or 42,000,000 feet, as compared with 1909. In British Columbia the cut of yellow pine has increased nearly 600 per cent, in one year. This increase, amounting to over 150,000,-000 feet, was sufficient to raise it in importance from fourteenth place to sixth place among the different spe-




