

STATE JEWELS GUARDED

SPECIAL SAFE FOR USE ON THE H.M.S. MEDINA.

The Keeper of the Jewels Has a Cabin Set Aside For His Use—A Valuable Collection to Keep Tab On.

Two crowns, to be worn by the King-Emperor and the Queen-Emress in the ceremonial of the Delhi Durbar, have been included among the state jewels to be taken to India in the custody of a special official, the Keeper of the Jewels, who has a cabin set aside for his use in H.M.S. Medina.

The King's crown for the Durbar is one specially made—a crown of India. The Queen will wear her coronation crown of diamonds, the magnificent specimen of the jeweler's art which was prepared for her crowning at Westminster Abbey.

The robes which the Queen intends to wear in the Durbar ceremonial are those she wore at her coronation, slightly altered and made lighter in consideration of the heat which will have to be borne at Delhi.

The Queen's private jewels, and the many priceless jeweled orders to be worn by Their Majesties upon occasions of state, also form part of the immensely valuable collection in the care of the Keeper of the Jewels in the Medina.

Twenty-four silver trumpets, to be used by the state trumpeters—who will, with their fanfares, herald the Durbar proclamation of the King-Emperor—have been made by Messrs. H. Potter & Co. of London.

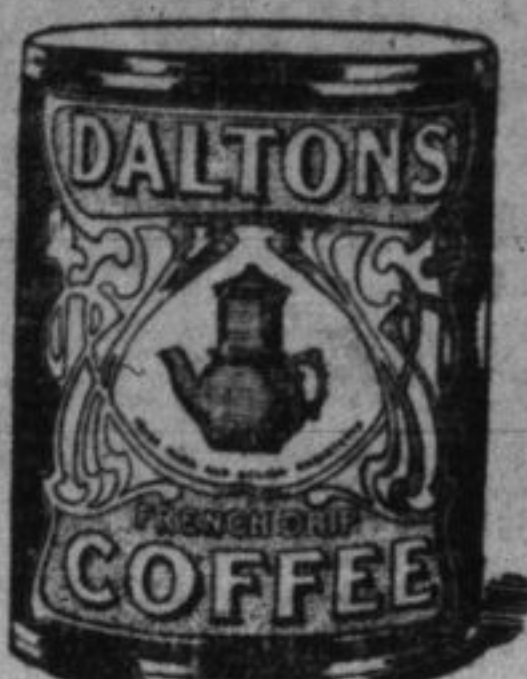

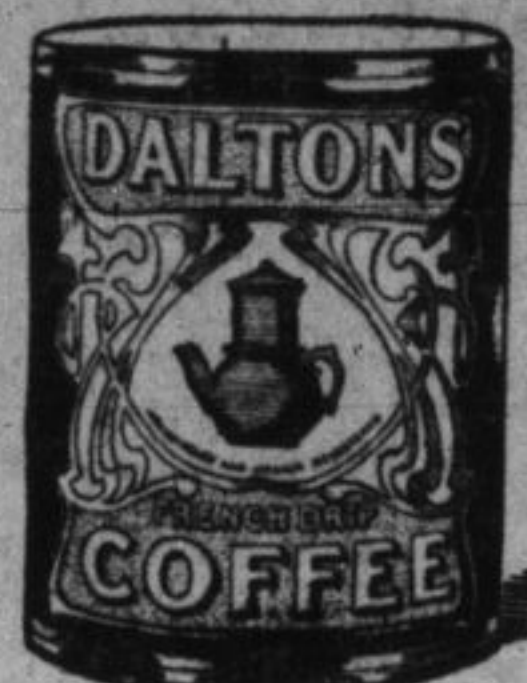

THE STOCK MARKETS

Prices Paid at the Various Centres.

Montreal, Dec. 4.—About 800 head of butchers' cattle, 200 calves, 1,200 sheep and lambs, and 700 hogs were offered for sale at the Point St. Charles stockyard, this forenoon.

Trade was fair, with slightly higher prices for beef and mutton cutters. Prime beefs sold at 5 1/2c to 6 1/2c per lb.; uredy good animals, 4c to 5 1/2c, and the common stock, 2 1/2c to 3 1/2c per lb.

Calves sold at 3c to 4c per lb. for grassers, and 5c to 6c per lb. for

good veals. Sheep sold at 4c per lb. lambs at 5 1/2c to 5 3/4c do. Good lots of hogs sold at about 6 1/2c per pound.

Toronto Cattle Prices.

Toronto, Dec. 4.—Union stock yards. Trade is somewhat firmer on the market, this morning, in choice stock, choice butcher cattle are selling as high as six cents. Common and medium cattle are not in very great demand. Hogs are somewhat easier.

Choice sheep and lambs are firm, but not showing extra high prices. Hogs show 25c, with 1,513 cattle, 44 calves, 324 hogs, 1,182 sheep. Sheep, ewes, \$3.25 to \$3.75; calves, \$4 to \$7.50; lambs, \$5 to \$5.25; bucks, \$5; hogs, 10c, \$6.50 do., fed and watered, \$6.25 export cattle, choice, \$6.10 to \$6.50; do, medium, \$5.50 to \$6.10; do, bulls, \$4.50 to \$5.25; butchers' cattle, choice, \$5.60 to \$6; do., medium, \$5 to \$5.50; do., common, \$3.75 to \$4.75; do., canners, \$1.50 to \$2.50; butchers' cows, choice, \$4.50 to \$6; do., medium, \$2.50 to \$4.25; do., bulls, \$3 to \$5; feeding steers, \$4.50 to \$5.10; do., bulls, \$3.25 to \$4; stockers, choice, \$4 to \$4.60; do., light, \$2.50 to \$3.50; milkers, choice, each, \$55 to \$90; do., common and medium, \$35 to \$45; springers, \$45 to \$65.

Liverpool Cattle Market.

Liverpool, Dec. 4.—John Rogers & Co., Liverpool, cabled to-day that owing to shortness of supplies in the Birkenhead Market, there was very little doing, but Saturday's prices, which were States steers from 13 1/2 to 14 1/2 cents; Canadians 13 1/2 to 14 cents, and ranchers 12 1/2 to 13 cents per pound, were well maintained.
