Arthur Craig, R.N., who has just been appointed to the captaincy of the world's most powerful battleship, is a cousin of Annisley Burrows, of Detroit, formerly of Kingston, Capt. Craig's new ship is the Orion, of the British navy. She carries ten of the gigantic 13.5 guns which are sufficient to blow any other dreadnaught out of water. These guns are 12.5 inches across the bore and carry a shell weighing 1,250 pounds. The largest gun at present carried by any ship of the Dreadnaught type are eleven-inch guns, carrying shells of 850 pounds weight. The Orion's guns will pierce twenty-six inches of Krupp steel at a distance of 3,000 yards, almost two miles. Other Dreadnaughts only penetrate seventeen inches. Capt. Craig is an Irishman, about forty-three years of age, and entered the navy about twenty-five years ago. Died on Wolfe Island. The death occurred at Wolfe Island, on Thursday, of Ross Ann McAllister, daughter of James McAllister. The deceased had been sick for some little time.
