**SORE ON THE MAYOR IN SPORTING CIRCLES**

**"TRUSTED" THE STUDENTS BY CALLING OUT THE "COPS."**

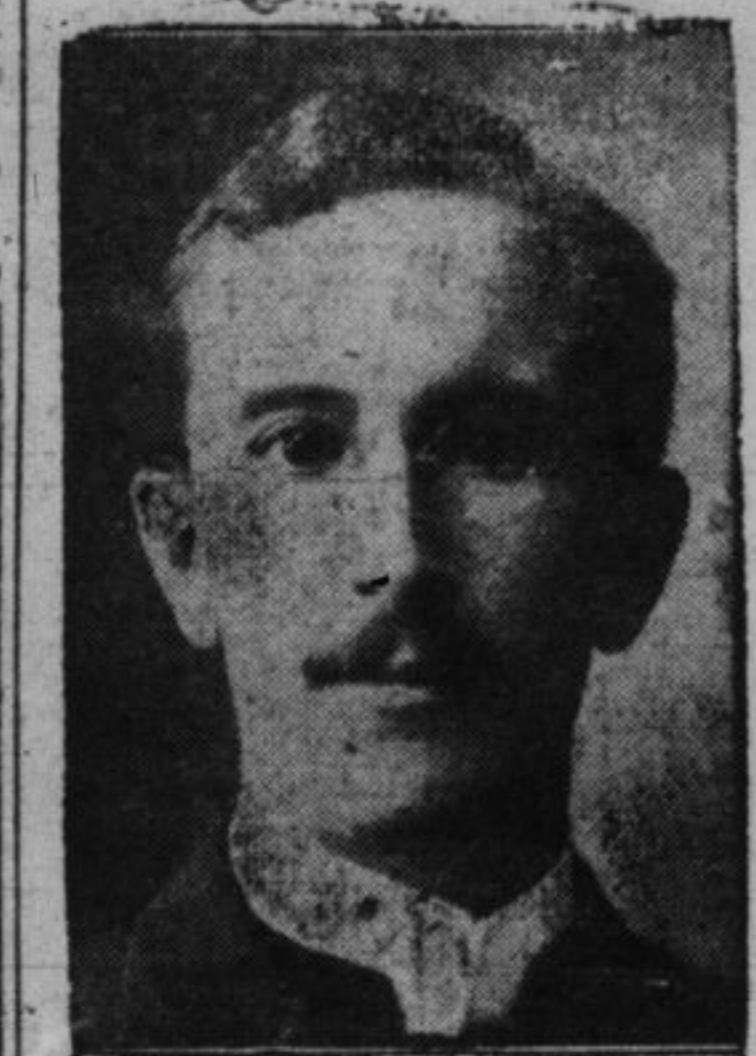
**Have Ideal Rugby Weather.**

Patrick Gray, who for eighteen years, 1858-1876, was minister of Chalmers' church, Kingston. He was born in Kingston, and educated at Queen's University. For some years he was pastor at Dundas, and this year was called to succeed Rev. Dr. Milligan, one of the greatest preachers Toronto ever had. Dr. Milligan also hailed from Kingston, and passed through Queen's University. Mr. Gray is occupying the pulpit of Chalmers' church on Sunday evening.

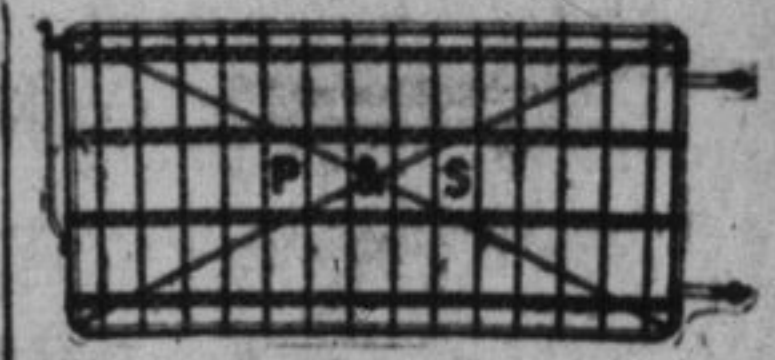
