WAS BEFORE THE MAGISTRATE FOR DRUNKENNESS.

The magistrate told Gunn that he had been coming before the court too often.

The charge against Gunn was made out a few weeks ago, but he could not be found to be served with the summons. Constables McCarry and Downey rounded him up near his home, while he was doing his best to give the constables the slip.

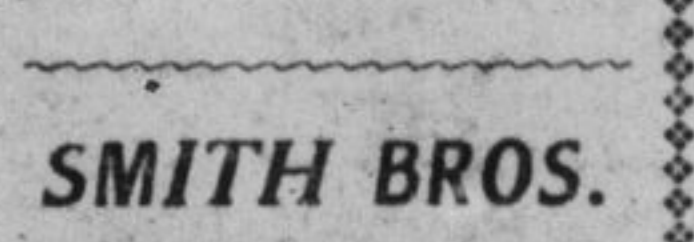
