## THE KING'S TRAIN.

Acme of Safety and Comfort Are Found In His Majesty's Special.

When King George travels by railway, he does so in remarkable safety and comfort. The royal train represents the sum of the railway carriage-builder's art. With their silver-mounted headstands, and easy chairs, and window draperies, it is difficult to realize that the apartments are sections of a railway carriage, while the smooth, easy, and almost silent running of the train serves to heighten the illusion. The various royal saloons used on different lines are built and owned by the respective companies, the royal party paying their fares like age charge for the special.

The program of running having been completed, a most interesting and complicated part of railway organization begins. Each company has a chart or "visualized time-table," as it has been called. This is divided vertically into twenty-four equal spaces, one for every hour of the day, and each hour is further subdivided into minutes, the half-hour, quarter-hour, and five minutes' intervals being denoted by darker lines.

The time-scale is then divided horizontally into a distance-scale, the stations and junctions being shown on the left hand margin in their relative positions.

On the chart the running of the trains is indicated by means of lines drawn from point to point across the scale, and colored to show the class of traffic. The professions brand is business, nothing else.

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Caintown Reports.

Those who are taking a late holiday will be interested to hear of an ideal health resort where no fees are demanded, and where the surroundings are as beautiful and picturesque as one could find anywhere.

At a high point of the Knockmealdown Mountains, in County Waterford, Ireland, there is a settlement of Trapist monks who welcome the passing stranger with medieval courtesy. In comfortable rooms guest-house folk are entertained for a fortnight, and a mile down the hillside there is a smaller hostel where ladies may stay a week.

For the accommodation and rich living no fees at all are exacted, but few of the guests refrain from voluntarily contributing to the unostentatious box that seems to hide itself so humbly at the entrance.

Around the monasteries is situated a large and prosperous farm, worked entirely by the monks and lay brothers. In the dairy is to be found the most modern machinery, and the fact that the present day jostics with the Middle Ages of every turn makes Mount Melleray Abbey trebly interesting.

Distinctions of faith count for little, and the majority of the brothers are garbed in white habits and are silent, except during the hours they spend at their devotions; only those in brown habits hold conversation with the guests.

Tubbing the Elephant.

A toilet that costs \$500! It sounds impossible to ordinary mortals; but, of course, an elephant is no ordinary mortal, and every one of his baths costs his owners well over five hundred dollars. His massive majesty's indulgence in a wash and brush up is, therefore, carefully limited to one a year.

Over 200 pounds of best soap is used for two elephants in the London Zoo. They are first thoroughly scrubbed with this, and then sent into the lake to wash it off again. It then takes eight men's constant attention for nearly a week to rub gallons of oil into the tough hides.

As the oil has to be of the best quality, it will be seen how expensive is the process. One of the most important parts of the operation is the cleaning out of the elephants' large flat ears. This is effected by means of a hard, long-fibred brush. The animals' toes also have to be pared with a file, and great precautions taken not to hurt the huge but sensitive creatures.

Curiously enough, the elephants seem to realize the importance of their yearly baths.
