APPOINTED ARCHITECT

TO REPRESENT CITY IN CONNECTION WITH NEW HOTEL.

William Newlands to be Paid \$1,400 For Overseeing the Work—City Solicitor to Advertise in Ontario Gazette.

The city council, at a special meeting on Monday evening, appointed William Newlands as architect to review the plans and specifications and oversee the building of the new hotel to be erected on the Carruthers site on King street. The city is guaranteeing the bonds of the hotel company to the extent of \$100,000, and the agreement with the company calls for the appointment of an architect to represent the city and give authority for the bond issue as the work of construction progresses.

The city solicitor was instructed to advertise in the Ontario Gazette the notice of the city's intention to apply to the legislature at its next session for the ratification of the by-law recently passed by the ratepayers.

The report of the finance committee recommending the appointment of William Newlands was presented by Ald. Elliott. The sum to be paid him is \$1,400. One-quarter of this amount is to be paid after he reports upon the plans and specifications; one-quarter when the first storey of the hotel is complete; one-quarter when the hotel is ready for plastering; and the last quarter when the buildings is reported by him as complete.

A communication was received from R. Beckwith stating that he had been asked to put in a tender for the work as supervising architect. His tender, he pointed out, was nearly 500 less than that of Mr. Newlands, and he asked the council why he was not appointed. No action was taken upon his communication.

THE FAIR CO-EDS.

Must Not Room in Houses in Which There Are Men.

Three weeks ago, the Whig made reference to the fact that Queen's Leveana Society had recommended to the senate that hereafter no girl student should be allowed to room in a house in which there are men students, unless special permission was granted by the senate. The latter body approved the recommendation, and next session Queen's calendar will contain a regulation embodying it. It is understood that certain actions reported to the Leveana Society forced that body to take the action it did. The Queen's Journal says:

"The securing of suitable boarding houses for the large and growing number of women attending Queen's is becoming a serious problem, and one that demands immediate solution. Mrs. MacNeill, the lady dean, has taken the matter up and will endeavor before next session opens to obtain a list of all suitable houses available to girl students. The action of the Leveana Society is considered both wise and necessary. The benefits of co-education may be the subject of debates, but apparently the system is here to stay. That being the case, every effort should be made to see that conditions are as ideal as possible. The point always kept in mind is that both men and women are here to be students first of all. It was this idea that principally prompted the action of the Leveana Society. The difficulty they are facing shows clearly the need that already exists for the speedy completion of the proposed new women's residence, for the number of good boarding houses open to girl students and to girl students only is at present very, very limited."

"SHOP EARLY" CAMPAIGN Was Given Setback by Weatherman Yesterday.

The "shop early" campaign was given a setback by the weatherman yesterday. The heavy rain prevented a large number of people from getting out to purchase the goods they intended to get.

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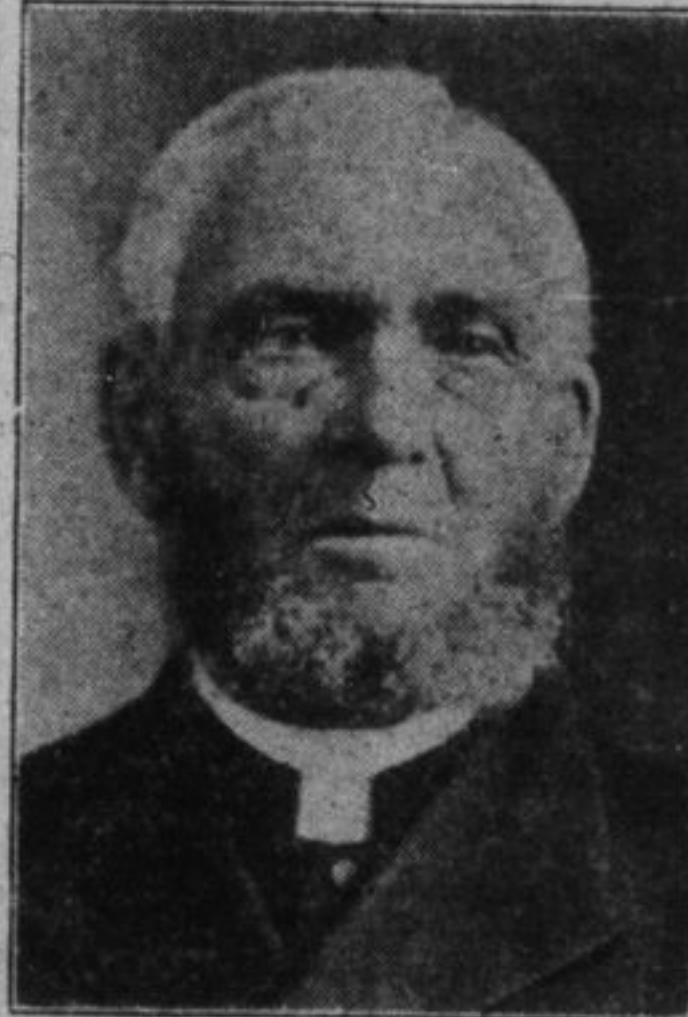


AGED MINISTER DEAD

REV. ROBERT LAIRD PASSES TO HIS REWARD.

Deceased Was the Father of Prof. Alexander and Prof. Robert Laird—He Was of a Distinguished Family.

Death called away, on Monday afternoon, one of the oldest and most faithful ministers of the Presbyterian church in the person of Rev. Robert Laird, in his eighty-fifth year, at his home, on University avenue. He was

stricken down Sunday morning with pneumonia, and never rallied. The late Mr. Laird was born in New Glasgow, Prince Edward Island, and was one of six sons of the late Hon. Alexander Laird. He was married twice; his first wife being Miss Martha Campbell, daughter of James Campbell, Tatamagouche, N.S., who died many years ago, and his second wife was Miss Barbara Campbell, daughter of Rev. Alexander Campbell, of Strathalbyn, P.E.I., who survives him. The late Mr. Laird attended high school in Central Academy, Charlotte

town, P.E.I. (now the Prince of Wales College), and also attended West River Seminary, Pictou, N.S., where he was a classmate of the late Principal Grant. In 1857 he crossed the Atlantic, and studied at the Free Church College, Edinburgh, Scotland, and also attended a session of the U.P. hall there.

In 1858 he was licensed to preach the gospel in the Presbyterian church in Prince Edward Island, and, in 1860, was ordained, his first charge being Princeton, P.E.I., where he faithfully labored for nineteen years. He was afterwards pastor, for some years, of the congregation of Little Harbor and Fisher's Grant, Pictou, N.S. In October, 1887, he was inducted to the pastoral charge of the congregations of Storrington, Pittsburg and Glenburnie, presbytery of Kingston, and retired from this wide field eleven years ago. Since then he resided in this city.

Deceased is survived by his wife, six sons—Rev. Prof. Alexander Laird, of the staff of the Royal Military College; Rev. Prof. Robert, of the staff of Queen's; James, in business in Philadelphia; Lyle, in business in Detroit; David, a lawyer in Winnipeg, at the present time in London, England; with a case before the privy council, and John Munro, a student at Queen's. Three daughters, Miss Bessie, of New York; Mrs. Frank Yeigh, of Toronto, and Miss Frances, at home. Deceased is also survived by two brothers, Hon. David Laird, ex-M.P. for Prince Edward Island, now school in Central Academy, Charlotte

homestead, in Prince Edward Island. One brother, William, M.P. for the island, died about a year ago, and another brother, the Hon. Alexander, a member of the government of the island, died a few years ago.

The Kingston presbytery, of which he was a useful and conscientious member, always in his place, on Thursday, April 28th, 1910, celebrated with him at a tea given by the ladies of Chalmers church, the fiftieth anniversary of his ordination to the Presbyterian ministry. From the very beginning he was a consistent advocate of church union. He was elder of Cooke's church and moderator of the same. He finished his work, Saturday night, in connection with extending the call to Rev. J. W. McIntosh, as minister, to fill the vacancy caused by Rev. Dr. MacDavid's transfer. The last church service deceased took part in was the communion service in Cooke's church on Sunday, December 3rd.

The funeral will take place from his late residence, University avenue, on Wednesday afternoon.
