KINGSTON'S CHANGE WOULD BE WELCOMED BY THE OUTSIDE PLACES.

Peterboro's City Council Presents That City's Claims—St. John, N.B., Also in Line.

The fact that the Commercial Envelope Co., of Binghamton, N.Y., has opened negotiations towards the establishment of a factory in Kingston has not escaped the attention of the publicity commission and boards of trade of other cities.

The following communication from the Peterboro city council has been received by the new company:

"We have been informed that you are interested in a company which contemplates establishing a factory in Canada and we would like to call your attention to Peterboro as an attractive location for it.

The River Ottonabee which runs through the city, furnishes abundant water-power, and there is power developed and undeveloped.

The shipping facilities are excellent. The city is situated between two commercial centres, Montreal and Toronto, and is on the lines from the Georgian Bay (which means the north-west) to the seaboard, and is a central location for reaching all parts.

The Grand Trunk branches out in four different directions and besides being on the main line of the Canadian Pacific, between Montreal and Toronto, it is also on the Canadian Pacific's new line to Georgian Bay.

The city is also on the Trent waterway, which is being built by the Dominion Government, and the portion which will open it to Lake Ontario are under contract.

The population of the city is 20,000. Manufacturing sites, suitably situated, are obtainable, with shipping facilities and excellent conveniences. Labor of all kinds is readily obtainable and labor troubles are unknown.

The workers are largely home owners and interested in the welfare of the city. While Peterboro has the attractions and conveniences of a city, expenses are lower than in larger centres, and the cost of labor is less.

The advantages of the location have attracted and built up a number of prosperous industries, including the Canadian General Electric company, employing 1,800 hands, the mills of the Quebec and Ontario Paper Company, the English Brimley Cart Company, and many others.

It is the policy of the city to facilitate and encourage the location of industries here, and we would be pleased to receive a visit from a representative of your industry, when the advantages could be viewed and you could confer with the council. If this is not convenient, we would be glad to hear from you at your earliest convenience, or we would be pleased to meet you at any point that would be convenient.

The board of trade of St. John, N.B., has also written the new box company in regard to establishing their plant in that city.

Now that other cities are casting envious eyes upon this proposed industry, and are prepared to do handsomely by it if it will forsake Kingston, the duty of the citizens is plainly manifest.

It is the duty of the city to grapple with this industry as the city with the strongest claims. That will mean that valiant work must be done on behalf of the by-law, and that the benefits accruing from the establishment of the industry must be impressed upon every voter.

The city now has a chance to secure a large industry on very easy terms, and it would be a calamity indeed to lose what rival cities are so anxious to obtain.
