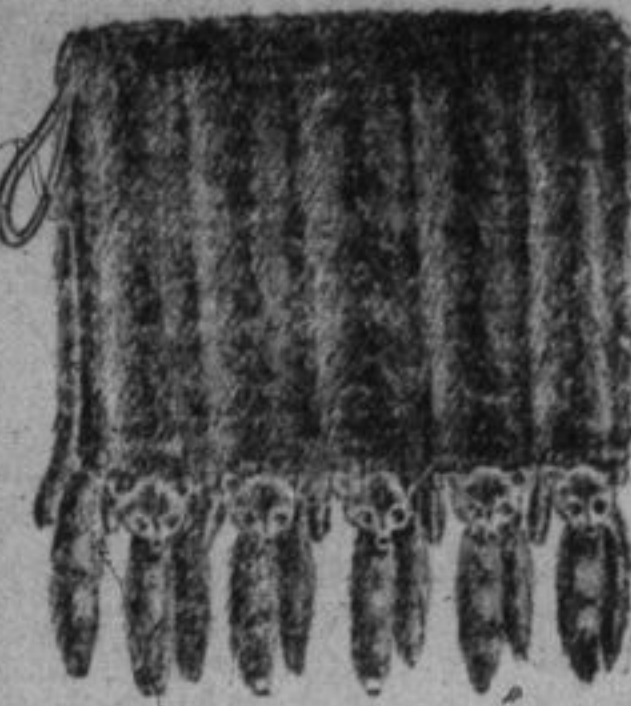

THE LATE THOMAS McADAM

Was a Resident of Kingston Since the Year 1833.

The late Thomas McAdam, who died on Tuesday afternoon, was long a resident of Kingston, and widely known and respected. He was born in Grafton, seventy-eight years ago. He learned the trade of machinist and came to Kingston about 1853, and later was one of the skilled men first taken into the locomotive works, where he had steady employment until laid aside by broken health a few years ago. Mrs. McAdam, whose maiden name was Elizabeth Makins, predeceased him some twelve years.

Her death was a great sorrow to the household, and indeed to all who knew her intimately, for she was an obliging and gracious friend.

The sickness which compelled Mr. McAdam to relinquish work was followed, not long after, by a distressing accident which made removal to the hospital for treatment necessary.

In his last moments, he was in the full possession of his faculties, and he was one of the most cheerful and uncomplaining of sufferers, taking an interest in things around him, and always glad to see his friends. Much as he must have felt the enforced confinement within the narrow bounds of the hospital, it is safe to say no one ever saw his Christian temper ruffled. All through his long illness, it was a great joy to him that his daughter was always within his reach.

During his life in the city, he was a consistent member of Chalmers church. The last acute attack was not long, and he was graciously delivered from protracted pain. The surviving children are: Miss Sude McAdam, in the city post office, and John McAdam, of Toronto, both of whom were at the bedside when he passed away.

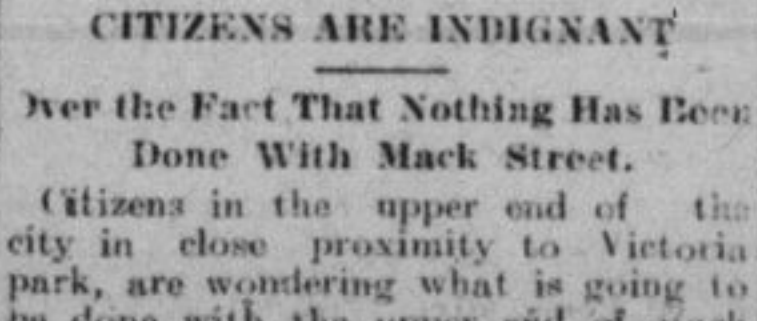

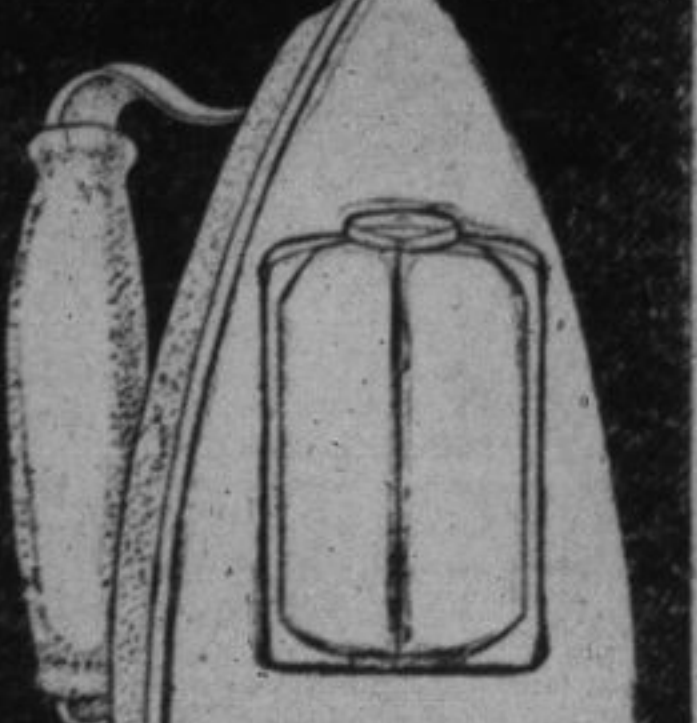
