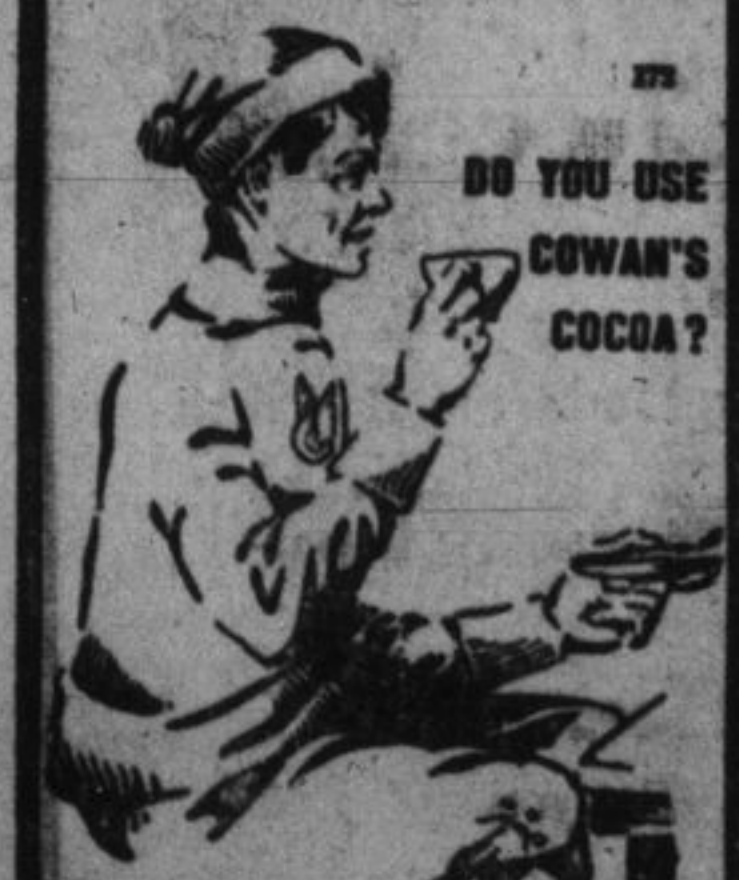

Mr. Wilson expresses himself as well pleased with the result of the vote, especially with that of Gananoque, which on September 24th, from the same list gave George Taylor over 250 majority, and to Mr. Dargavel a paltry ten.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS. ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE owner of a family or any male over 18 years of age may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The homestead must appear in person at the Dominion Land Office in person at the office of the district. Entry by proxy may be made in certain cases, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intended homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 10 acres so long as he occupies the land. Duties must be paid in certain districts a homesteader who has exchanged his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$100 per acre. Duties must be paid six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.
